The Board then proceeded to the consideration of Claims for relief in the Workhouse and Fever Hospitals of the Union from the Relieving Officers Book — most of the applicants had been admitted into Fever Hospital — three cases admitted to Out door relief and the remainder to the Workhouse. — In the case of Ellen King an applicant for the latter she stated she had been taken out to service by Patrick Connors of Banogue — that he agreed to give her 8/- a quarter and that the Board gave her a suit of clothing going to town, but that he having put her to work at what was wholly out of her power to do he discharged her and paid no wages.

Ordered. Patrick Connors to be summoned before the Bench of Magistrates by the Master for the wages due to Ellen King.

A Letter was read from Mr. Graham Apothecaries Hall enclosing copies of further

correspondence respecting the Analysis of Medicine that had been made at the instance of the Board all of which were read.

Ordered. The Clerk to inform Mr. Graham that the Board did not at any time think that the Medical Hall would send out any but genuine medicine but in consequence of one of the Medical Officers having found fault, the Board considered it only right to have the Analysis in order to set themselves and Mr. Graham right before the Ratepayers.

Mr. Cooke gave notice to have his name inserted in the Rate Book for a portion of the lands of ~~Donnafree~~ ^{Bloomfield} instead of William Donovan.

Mr. Furmar came before the Board and submitted a copy of Requisition to the High Sheriff calling on him to convene a meeting of his Bailiwick in order to consider the propriety of contributing to alleviate the severe famine now felt in India.

Resolved — That the Chairman be requested to sign the requisition on part of the Board and which was done accordingly.




None advanced beyond the simple rules of Arithmetic and of 25 examined only 10 could work very easy questions. Twenty four Copy Books were shown. They were carefully written and neatly kept.

" Female School - 42 present, of these 26 are learning only the first Book and these appear to have been duly attended to. In the 2nd Class 10 present read correctly. In the sequel and 3rd

Classes the reading is fluent and intelligent and the Pupils know something of Grammar but they are deficient in Geography. 14 Copy Books shown of which 7 are well written.

Needlework and other Industrial instructions have been carefully attended to. The Male School at present exhibits a very low state of proficiency caused by changes of Teachers and for which the present Teacher is not responsible. He appears well qualified and anxious to improve the pupils. However both Schools ought to be found in a much more advanced state at the next inspection.
