As much as can be done for her whilst there is no prospect of recovery in the want of moral treatment there is no prospect of recovery in the want of moral treatment. Even whilst she remains in the Lunatic Asylum she ought not to be kept locked up in solitary confinement, but should be allowed to walk about with two persons to take care of her who may be relieved at intervals. Begs also to report that an able bodied Young Girl named Catherine Potts never before affected with Epilepsy has been most violently attacked with it. The cause must be looked for in the air or discipline of the House—the diet being better than such persons get at their homes. Considers that the want of Out door employment and even of active exercise within doors—the close state of the dormitories at night from the windows not being open, and the pestilential effluvia from the privies, are more than sufficient to produce such diseases; the privies in the Hospital yards are so offensive that the patients cannot walk in the yards.




