





P. L. C. The mother of one of the Boys who enlisted was called but having declined to be sworn was not examined.

Mr. E. Stapleton Master of the workhouse was next examined on oath by Mr. Burke—Dr. Cranfield being duly affirmed was also examined by Mr. Burke; In conclusion the following resolutions were proposed by Mr. P. Whelan and seconded by Mr. McWhelan—That the future usefulness and permanency of this Institution demand that its Officers confine themselves within the sphere of their defined duties and that any serious deviation from this line of conduct would operate most injuriously in the carrying out of the present Poor Law system.

2nd That the recent conduct of Dr. Craufield, Medical Officer and Thomas Boyd the Schoolmaster in introducing the Military into this establishment to enlist some of its inmates without consulting the Guardians has created a deep sensation throughout the entire Union which nothing can allay unless reasonable satisfaction be given to the ratepayers for such an unwarrantable proceeding. 3rd That whilst we deprecate such conduct in those officers we are of opinion that the over officious and underhand tampering of the Schoolmaster with the Boys in the House for enlistment, not to say anything of his unfitness, is so highly objectionable as to disqualify him from holding his present situation. To which the following amendment was proposed by W. R. Farmer Esq and seconded by M. J. Wallace Esq viz That in future no Military Party be admitted into the House without the directions of the Guardians. On a Division, there appeared for the amendment 10 against it 18. The original resolutions were then put when the Division took place there appeared for them 16, against them 7, and they were declared by the Chairman to be carried. That He labours under bodily disabilities such as in our judgement should disqualify any Teacher from being selected to fulfill his Office - as for instance Paralysis of the Hands which must render his capacity for due instruction in writing and figures very doubtful or at most very imperfect - defect of vision, as He cannot discern a Boy's countenance from his desk to the lower seat in the schoolroom - his age, now approaching halfway between 60 and 70 years rendering him quite unfit to assist the master in many departments calling for his assistance but more particularly in that of training up the grown youths to the knowledge of Spade Husbandry or other agricultural pursuits and this at a time when the Assistant Commissioner is loudly complaining of the neglected state in which the workhouse grounds are lying.

That in addition to these reasons we have the testimony of the Assistant Commissioner to the state in which He found the School on his visit to the workhouse the 6th December last when the Board on his recommendation passed a resolution of reprimand against the Schoolmaster for the unsatisfactory and dirty condition in which He found the schoolroom. 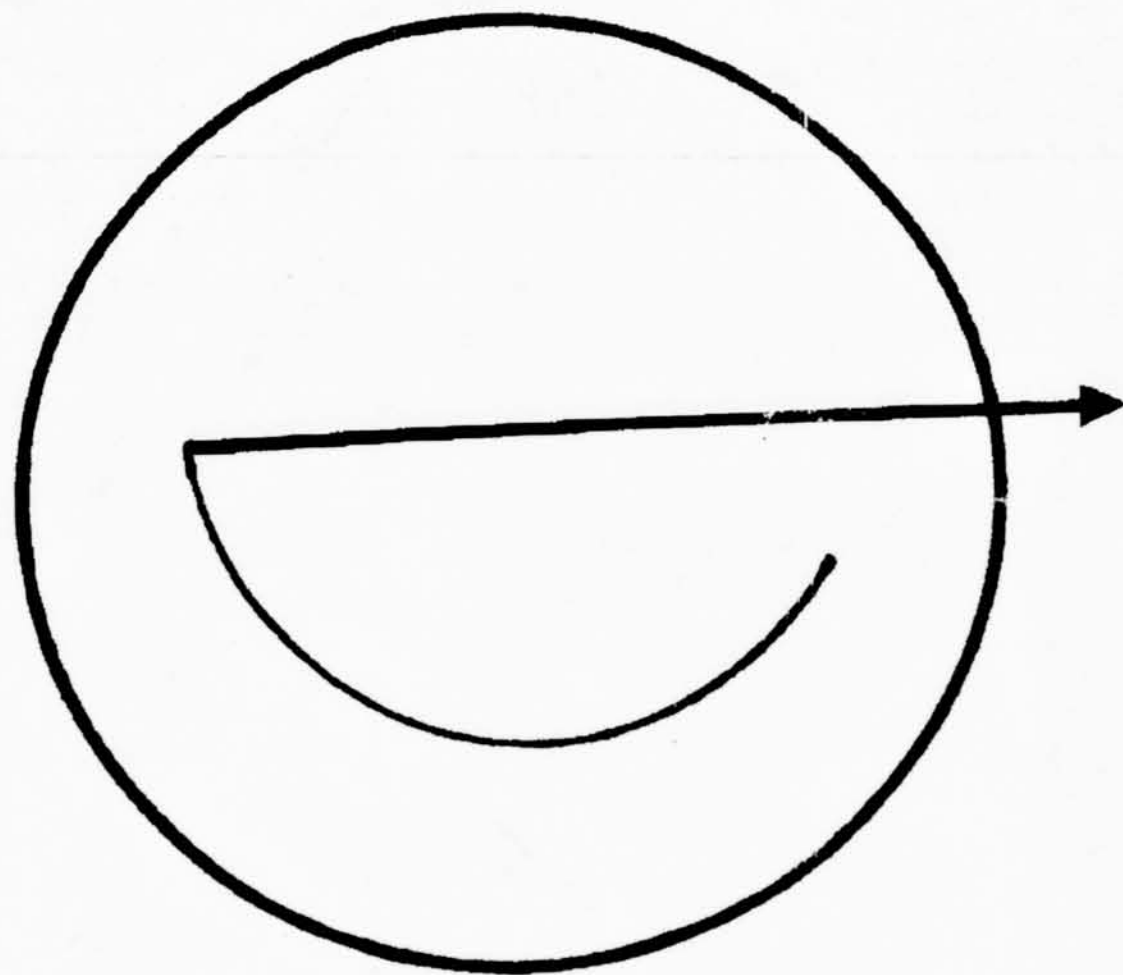
