On the body being removed by the friends it appears an altercation took place between the father & husband as to which of them would bury her - the latter succeeded. - consequently the former lodged an information against the husband stating that he hastened her death. There was an Inquest held & a verdict returned that she came by her death from natural causes.

That he had Mr. Thomas Murphy to inspect the waggon Drives who is of opinion that 10 of the Waggon can be made available by repairing them and there are 8 unfit for use. It will be therefore necessary to advertise for 8 new Waggon agreeably to specification which he will prepare and submit to the Board for approval on next Thursday.

Arne Dempsey admitted in the Emmscotthly Deers Hospital on the 4th and died the same night.
