A Letter was read from the South Dublin Union in reference to the property rated under the Poor Law which amounted to about 12 Millions whilst the property rated to the Income Tax was about 22 Millions with a form of Petition to Parliament that the principle of allowing all local rates and taxes to be borne by one class of property is unsound and unjust whilst the funded property of Ireland is allowed to escape except from Income Tax alone.

The Board proceeded to consider the applications for relief in and out of the Workhouse and in the Poor Hospitals of the Union from the Relieving Officers Book and granted such to all deserving cases.

On reading over some Certificates from Medical Officers not quite as explicit as they ought to be it was ordered — That the Clerk again call the attention of the Medical Officers to the Resolution adopted by the Board in the 20th July last a copy of which was sent to each — relative to Certificates for out-door relief in which they should state whether or not the person to whom the Certificate refers is or is not able to appear before the Board.

216 Michael Stetman who had been on Out door relief and struck off a week ago appeared again claiming to be put on the Out door relief and laid before the Board a list of Ratepayers in the Division to which he was charged with consenting to the relief being given to him — after consideration it was stated to the Board by the Guardian of the Division that many of the largest Ratepayers assured him that they signed this document under a misapprehension and were not disposed to give the applicant out door relief.

The Application of Collector Edward Doyle for remuneration for posting notices — was again considered and refused on the ground that as the Board pay their Collectors fairly they ought not to be so particular as to ask the Board to pay them for posting up their placards three or four times a year.

In reply to the request made by the Board on last Board day Doctor Goodisson put in a statement informing the Board that Convalescent patients of the better class have refused to wear the clothing provided for them by the Union — and that it was his opinion that if such patients were compelled to wear the clothing

It would be the means of preventing many from seeking admission into the Poor Hospital, that every attention is paid to the purifying all clothing worn by patients admitted.

Master's Report

He begged to lay before the Board a list of prices of agricultural seeds received from Edmundson Brothers, 10 Dame Street, Dublin.

A person named Peter / Brien admitted provisionally by the Relieving Officer on Saturday Evening last 22nd Inst in a dying state - died in about 1/2 an hour after admission. On his arrival at the Workhouse he immediately sent for the Priest & Doctor who were quickly in attendance but unfortunately the poor man expired just as they were entering the premises. Brien was accompanied to the House by his son and daughter - there was 2/11 found on his person which he handed over to the latter. There was an Inquest held on the body and a verdict returned that deceased came to his death from natural causes and that the Relieving Officer acted most judiciously in having him removed to the Workhouse.

He found a sum of 14/10 with an Inmate named Mary Pond who demanded her discharge which he refused until the Board enquire into the matter.

An Inmate for named Janett Carthy reported on the 30th January last as having deposited money with the late Master Taylor obtained a decree on yesterday for £5.17.0 - the Board will please to give directions on the matter.

That he had received a note from Doctor White Carlow Asylum stating that there is a vacancy in the Asylum for the inmate Mary Leary who if not sent at once the vacancy will be filled up.

That he had given possession of the thatched Cottage to Robert Cozgrove on Monday last 24th Inst.

There were two children named Mary & John Sutton aged 9 & 5 years admitted last night at 6 O'clock in a very deplorable state particularly the girl - It appeared their parents are in Bridwell charged with neglecting them.

He was proud to say that the affairs of the Union were administered in a very satisfactory manner and that the ratepayers ought to feel very grateful to those Guardians by whom he had been ably assisted and who gave to their time and attention in watching over their interests and he believed he could truly say that the Union of Enniscorthy might now be looked upon as the model Union of the County — after again thanking the Board he sat down.

Mr James Power then rose and expressed his warm acknowledgments to the Board for again electing him to the Vice Chair — he regretted he could not attend so frequently as he wished but when in the County he shall give every attention in his power.

Mr L W Carrigan then returned thanks for the honour of being elected to the Vice Chair by so respectable a body as the Enniscorthy Board of Guardians and said that it will afford him great pleasure to give his attention to the affairs of the Board on every occasion in his power — after again thanking the Board he resumed his seat.

In the female School the children at his request wrote from dictation.

In visiting the female Infirmary Wards he took occasion to ask two Protestant inmates namely Mr. Parsons and Anne Bradley if in the course of their visits to the House the Sisters of Mercy had ever addressed them on the subject of religion and both these inmates concurred in stating that the Sisters of Mercy on every occasion abstained from speaking to them in such a manner.
