Mr. Burke apt. Commissionaire brought before the Board A communication from the P.L. Commissionaires and a resolution of the Carlow Board of Guardians relative to a Townland called Craan in the County of Carlow containing 477-1-25 by mistake included in the Commissionaire Union and omitted from the Carlow Union.

Resolved That the Clerk be directed to write to

the Hon. J. B. Maxwell or his Agent to learn if the Townland of Craan above mentioned is Mr. Maxwell's property, as we understand that it was the intention of the apistant Commissionaires who formed this Union to have all Mr. Maxwell's estate included in the Electoral Division of Newtownbarry; and that in the event of this Townland not being Mr. Maxwell's estate we see no objection to our consenting to its being taken from this Union.

Mr. Burke apist. Commissionaire reported having made an inspection of the workhouse on yesterday and this day, and he regretted to state that he found many parts of it in any but a satisfactory state, the Bedsteads in the infirmary wards were not clean, and the Bedsteads and bedding in the Male Idiot wards were in a filthy condition, the clothes store was in a very untidy state, as was also the Boys workshop. The attendance of the children at dinner was not orderly — men are admitted inside the kitchen yard to wash the potatoes which is objectionable, the work being better done by, and more suited for, able-bodied women, and which arrangement would permit the men to be employed in putting the yards and other parts of the grounds in order. There were many other trifling matters he had to remark on, and although the Matrons illness may excuse some of the irregularities

Yet on the whole He concludes that the Master has not been sufficiently attentive. There were many matters in the Boys School which Mr. Burke had to speak about to the Schoolmaster, who stated that He had not been apprised of his duties by the Master, Mr. Burke can therefore attach no blame to the Schoolmaster, who seems anxious to be instructed in his duties. Mr. Burke would particularly draw the attention of the Guardians to whether the expense nearly £40 a year incurred by a hired Shoemaker and Tailor is repaid by the work made, and with that view a statement should be required from the Master shewing the cost of wages and materials and the work done. The Schoolmaster complains of the insubordination of the Boys, and Mr. Burke recommends that the Guardians should assist the Schoolmaster in enforcing order in his school. The Privies and Cesspool have not it appears been cleaned since the opening of the Workhouse. Proposed by Mr. P. Whelan, seconded by Mr. C. Gumble and resolved, That the schools of this Workhouse be placed in communication with the National Board of Education. The Clerk read a notice of marriage sent to him for that purpose by the District Registrar. Mr. P. Whelan proposed, seconded by Mr. C. Gumble and resolved, That Thomas Hynds tender to floor the Boys Schoolrooms with tiles equal to sample sent in at 3-4 of a square yard be accepted. and same ordered to be done at once.
