One of which was, that Buttermilk had usually been mixed with Sweetmilk for the Childrens Breakfasts, though Sweetmilk

Only is allowed, and such was always charged in the Provision Check Account. Another was, that some days food had been charged for Paupers after they had left the House. - The Medical Officer, Matron, Porter, and lastly the Master, were severally examined on those and other matters - and after a lengthened Investigation and discussion - the following resolution was,

Proposed by W. B. Farmer Esq & seconded by Capt. Munn & unanimously resolved - That we do not approve the manner in which the Master has been keeping his Books; That in consequence, we have no means of accurately comparing the number of Paupers each day in the House, or the number of meals which should be charged to each Pauper, with the meals actually consumed; and that we also find a deficiency in the clothing. We therefore direct the Porter to take an account of the number of Paupers in the House at 12 O'clock each day, also the hours at which each is discharged and admitted; and we order the Master to keep the Books in future accurately and regularly according to the Printer form.

The following report on the state of the House was made by Mr. Burke Assistant Comms^r.

James Conisworthy Union Workhouse
Friday 29 Aug^r 1845

Mr. Burke Assistant Comms^r begs to inform the Guardians that on yesterday he made an inspection of the workhouse. Mr. Burke regrets to say that on this as on the former visits which he paid to it he found the Establishment in anything but that best

and orderly condition in which it should be the Beds - particularly at the Men's side - were in a slovenly state containing various matters such as portions of the Paupers clothing &c and in almost every instance the Paupers Male and Female had on portions of their own clothing the rooms in which the workwomen were was dirty - and the Hospital any thing but clean the yards attached to it were in a filthy condition and a stench issued from one of the open channels which was choked up and seemed not to have been swept for a long time. The Boys dormitories and Beds were not in a proper state the Beds being in many instances torn and which the Matron says is frequently the case although she has had them repeatedly repaired, it being the duty of the Schoolmaster to take care that the Boys do not injure the bedding in this way.

The Women seem to be employed and as far as the Matron is concerned Mr. Burke thinks if she were assisted the House would go on well. The Girls in the School appear to be properly attended to - The Grounds attached to the workhouse and the several yards of the Establishment remain in an unfinished state with about 150 Male Paupers in the workhouse including of course the schoolboys little or no work seems to be going on and the consequence will be that the idle and the lazy will make it their resort and the Boys instead of being instructed as Agricultural Labourers as in other workhouses and which enables them to earn their Bread elsewhere will grow up in idleness and remain a burden

On the Establishment. Mr. Burke regrets to learn that with the exception of one member of the Visiting Committee none of the others attend it becomes therefore more essential in such a case that the Person placed over an Establishment of this nature should be one of sufficient Capability to Conduct it; so much depends on the judgement and Activity of the Master in enforcing the due discipline and industrial habits of the Establishment that Mr. Burke seeing a deficiency in this respect as regards the Master of the Ennisconry Workhouse cannot throw so much blame as he otherwise would on the subordinate Officers of the Establishment. The Board resolved That with reference to the report of the Assistant Commissioner we feel bound to state in justification of the Master as to the industrial habits of the inmates that in many instances it has been occasioned by the Master not having been sufficiently instructed to have the Men and Boys more employed and that in future the Master do pay more attention to the employment of the Male Paupers more particularly the Boys whilst school hours shall be limited as under the Regulation to 3 hours each day. Ordered that 6 shades & 6 shovels be provided for the use of the Boys - and that tenders for 6 doz shawls shall be procured in order that the shawls worn by the Paupers and belonging to them may be put up. Res. That the following be appointed Visiting Committee for the month of September. *Mr. White, Mr. Whelan & Mr. Byrne* At the recommendation of the Asst. Commissioner the Master was directed in future to make Linsey, Woolsey and flannel from the worst spins in the House - not stockings as hitherto. 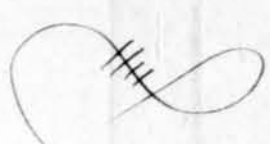

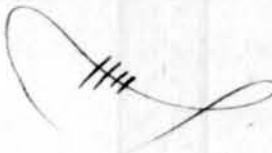
