The Master complained that the meat she is supplied with is generally bad and sometimes tainted and that the Master orders good meat for himself and is indifferent as to the quality furnished to the other Officers. I would recommend the Master to be investigated and if such complaints arise from a bad feeling and without cause they should be put a stop to.
