The Clerk's Report of Vaccination was read—(this on the first meeting in every month.) Number of successful cases.

The Report of the Visiting Committee was read, and Orders were made thereon as follows:

The Master reported, that as the sinking of the Well, was nearly completed, it would be well, if the Board considered the propriety of putting up a wooden Pump, instead of the old force Pump, which the Miners very strongly recommended that is the simplest, cheapest and most effectual for ensuring a sufficient supply of water, and without the risk of being constantly out of Order, as was the case with the force Pump now taken up. That, if it was ordered, they would superintend its erection before they leave.

The Schoolmaster represented that a portion of the Roof, of the Templeshannon House, over the Boys' Dormitory, required mending; and a very offensive smell arising from the privy, under the Kilt Room, through which the rain had come down lately.

The Master was directed to send a competent person to view those portions of the Building complained of, and to report to the Board at their sitting on Tuesday.

Ordered, That Mr and Mrs Rigley be discharged from the Work House; both being able bodies.

Several of the collectors attended and their accounts examined; and it appearing that John Roche, who was ordered on the last day of meeting to lodge the Balance on hand, about £30.00 as then represented by the Clerk, had ~~reduced~~ reduced it only five pounds. The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon, as follows:

It was ordered, that the same be notified to his Sureties, and that Mr Donovan, our Solicitor, be instructed to apply to them to lodge that amount with the Treasurer, or that immediate proceedings will be instituted against them for recovery.

John Kelly, collector of Ballyhogue, did not come in, as ordered, with his Books; and having been very inefficient, latterly, in collecting the arrears on his District. The Clerk was directed to write to him, requesting him to deliver up his Books, and to send in his Resignation, by this day week.

On enquiry into the cases, notified by Mr Lett it was found that Thomas Fitzhenry was properly registered on the Union at Large and that James Leuthbert was also properly registered on the Union at Large.

The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board and directions given thereon, as follows:

Proposed by J. Ponder, Seconded by L. Doyle, and Resolved. That the Relieving Officer for Ennisceathy be directed to apprise all persons receiving Out-door Relief in his District, that they will be required to attend this Board, on Tuesday 29th instant, otherwise, Relief will be withdrawn from them.

A Letter was read from the Poor Law Commissioners, Dated 17 August 1848 N^o 40964, in reference to the notice served on the Board by M. Wallace, claiming exemption from Poor Rates for the Bog of Clorogue, stating, that, if he felt aggrieved, he should have applied to the Quarter Sessions, under the 101st Section of the Act 1st & 2nd Vic Cap. 56. That, he was rated as Occupier, allowing persons, for a consideration, to cut turf on the Bog; and that M. Wallace, by their so doing, does not cease to be occupier, and therefore properly rated.

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, (or, Orders made on them, respectively, as follows:)

One from same dated 15 August 1848 N^o 43581 in reference to the election of Edward M. Connack, as Master, expressing their sanction of same; and in reference to the election of Assistant Master, George Magner, enclosing questions to be answered by himself and the Clerk.

One from same Dated 15 August 1848 N^o 44096, stating that, they had had a communication from the Inspector, M. Burke, with reference to the delay in the Revision of the Books by M. Keating; and calling on the Board to urge him to complete his Revision without delay, and hand the Books over to the Clerk, in order to the immediate preparations of the Rate Books.

One from same, Dated 14 August 1848 N^o 439 which enclosed questions relative to the condition of the Potatoe crops, in this Union; and requesting information respecting the condition of other Crops in the Union.

One from same, Dated 15 August 1848, N^o 44678, communicating instructions, in reference to the making of the Rates, and enclosing forms for Estimate of the Rates.

One from same Dated 16 August 1848 enclosing a letter from the Public Works Loan Office, which required payment of the 3rd 4th 5th and 6th instalments, amounting to £1400, on the Loan of £7000, for building the Union Work House, in addition to the sum of £457.10. demanded on the 23rd May, 1845. Requesting the Amount to be lodged to the credit of the Bank of England, in the Bank of Ireland, in favour of the Commissioners of Public Works and Fisheries.

On the Application of the Solicitor, respecting a Defaulter in payment of Rates, against whom a Decree was obtained against the person, and executed with unusual difficulty, the Bailiffs were allowed to be paid £1; it appearing the Rates would have been lost, if they had not executed the Decree.

Ordered. That an Application be made to the Medical Officer of the Fever Hospital, for a Return of the cases charged to the Work House; specifying their nature and time in Hospital, requesting that any Chronical, or other cases, which might be treated without danger of Contagion in the Work House, be sent down here from the Fever Hospital.

A Committee, consisting of the Honorable P. S. Law, W. R. Farmer, M. Wallace, and P. J. H. Harty, were requested to review and examine the proposed Rates, according to the Circular Letter, lately received on that subject, from the Commissioners.

After some time they returned, and handed in their scale of Rates, for adoption by the Board. Upon consideration, it was,

Moved by M. Keock, Seconded by M. Farmer, and Resolved, That, the following Rates be adopted, in accordance with the recommendation of the Commissioners, for the Ordinary expenditure of the Union, and repayment of the Government Advances up to the 25th of March 1849

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The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year).

Resolved Moved by M^r Walsh, Seconded by M^r Maher, and That, with reference to the Electoral Division of Newtown Bamy, Templeshambo, and Monast and Ferns. it is the opinion of the Board, that, the Rates proposed to be struck according to the Scale suggested by the Commissioners, as acted upon this day, will press on those Divisions which are the poorest in the Union, with such severity, that we strongly recommend it to the consideration of the Commissioners, whether with respect to those Divisions, it would not be expedient, to decide on smaller Rates for the present, thus extending the repayment of the Government advances over a longer period.

Doctor Cranfield having attended, explained the apparently high cost of Seven Patients, which this last month averaged 8/10 per head weekly. by stating that all the patients, in the Hospital were supported at the expense of the Union which number being compared with the sum expended, reduced the average to below 1/3 per head per week; whereas, by the former high calculation, the Hospital got credit but for the number it contained from the Work House, - 35, the total number being 75.

Tenders for the situation of Porter, were opened and read, from three candidates; one of whom having no mover or seconder, the other two, - Maurice Doyle and Michael Furlong were put in nomination. Upon a Poll being taken, by the Chairman, Michael Furlong had a majority of two votes; upon which he was declared duly elected to the situation of Porter to the Work House.

M^r Lett brought forward the case of James Murphy, Relieving Officer, with reference to his competency; and after examining him in a few calculations, some of the Guardians

The Mahon requested leave of absence, to go, for the benefit of his health, to the Sea Side; and on consideration, the Board granted his application; the Schoolmistress to take his place, during his absence.

Ordered, That Maurice Doyle, be appointed to act in the situation, vacant by the Election of Michael Furlong as out wounds man, at one Shilling per day, and the House diet, and that he be paid his wages weekly.

The Chairman signed the Abstracts of the Union Accounts.

The Chairman then signed the Cheques on Treasurer, as recommended by the Finance Committee, and the Board soon after adjourned to Tuesday the 22nd August 1848

He also attended the Board's Meeting, and explained the several Balances. He attests that of the Treasurer, being striking out £6.5.6, a charge made for Interest on an advance of £500 to the Board in the month of July 1847.

Moved by Mr. Farrar, seconded by W. J. Wallaw that, our Treasurer be apprised of the illegality of the entry of £6.5.6 of the 24th December 1847, as a charge for Interest upon the Rate; and that he be requested to apply to the Commissioners for the Interest guaranteed by them for the advance made to this Board, by their Letter of the 5th July 1847.

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, or, Orders made on them respectively, as follows:—

Mr. Doyle gave notice, that, he will, on Saturday the 9th September Instant, move, that the Board do at once determine, on retaining or giving up, on the 29th instant, to Mr. Darby Doyle, the Store at Saffry Gate, held by this Board from him.

J. Roche, Collector, was called up, and it appearing he had a Sum of £33.14.10⁰ on hands, the Clerk was directed to issue a Summons for his appearance before the Bench at Petty Sessions, for Monday, the 11th instant, unless, he previously lodges the Amount with Treasurer.

Mr. Wallaw brought forward the charges, of which he gave notice, against Collector Doran; and the Collector was in attendance.

The Clerk was directed to read a minute, placed on the Books, 13th December last, which states, "That, on the Report of Collector Doran, that W. J. Wallaw Esq. having refused to pay Rates, amounting to about £36.— he required professional aid at the Petty Sessions. That the Board, however, considered it more desirable to proceed through the Superior Courts; but, before resorting to these measures, for enforcing payment, they requested advice from the Commissioners."

Mr Wallace then charged the Collector with having allowed a long period to elapse before he sought ~~for~~ payment of the Rate on a certain No of the Rate book, that subsequently that No has been divided on the Valuation books by which a part only of the land is now in the occupation of Mr Wallace,

that Doran had taken part payment of the rate from one of the parties and had recently seized a cow grazing on Mr Wallace's part for the Balance some three pounds same being contrary to the instructions of the Commissioners.

Collector Doran explained that the property on the premises before the division lately made by the Revisor was under Sheriff's Execution for a long period and that under the circumstances he had not power to enforce payment of the Rate from that Occupier, that so soon as the lands had gone out of the possession of that Occupier and the late Revision had taken place he applied to all the parties for their respective payment of rate which would make up the same rate on the property previous to such revision and that unless in the instance under consideration he had quietly received payment. It further appeared that the cow seized was not the property of Mr Wallace, merely what is termed a cow at grass, that on the seizure being made he had replenished until to day. After considerable discussion the Board appeared to be of opinion Doran had not exceeded the limits of his duty and made no resolution on the subject. In consequence Mr Wallace stated he would produce the Cow to Doran for sale.

An Application was read from Ten adult Boys inmates of about 15 yrs. of age some of them for a long time in the Workhouse requesting to be provided with suitable clothing and to be sent to sea or to the Colonies that they might no longer be a burthen on the rates. They being all able-bodied youths the Board considered them fit objects for emigrations but first refered the matter to the considerations of the Commissioners.

At the request of Mr Wallace the Clerk was directed to make a call on the Board to consider at their meeting on the 16th. Just the most suitable replies to the Queries of the Boundary Comm^{rs}.

The Abstracts of the Union Account. were signed by the Chairman and Auditor.

(Signed) Anna Lett

The Board ordered that the Master shall provide the Handman, and Maids, should they allow such an irregularity to occur again.

Mr White accompanied by Mr Lett visited the Workhouse on the 5th September, and reported that they found the Kitchen clean and regular, the School girls making considerable progress, but regret they could not say the same respecting the boys School, that the

dormitories were clean, but the windows having been neglected to be closed, the rain had entered and the floors were much wetted.

The Master was ordered to cause a stricter watch, in having the sashes closed, when a change of weather brought rain.

The Schoolmaster was called before the Board, and reprimanded, promising to do his best with the Schoolboys in future.

The Master reported, that the apartment formerly ordered for females of a certain class, is now used as the Nursery, and consequently there is no means of separating the good from the bad, and the old Nursery is now the Infant School. That 20 of the Eldest schoolgirls, are now engaged at spinning Flax and wool, at which they are making considerable progress. He suggested the extension of the Clothing Store in the Female yard, as far as the Outer Wall, for the purpose of using it as a Workroom for the elder school-

The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board and directions given thereon, as follows:

That Catherine Lowe registered a Protestant requested to be visited by the Roman Catholic Chaplain last night, that she appeared to be then dying, that notice was sent to the Protestant and R.C. Chaplains that Rev. Dr Roche attended her, and that she died about 12 o'clock same night.

The Punishment Book shewed amongst other offences for which the Master had inflicted chastisement, that of John Leary who had scaled the walls at the Templeshannon House, and entered through one of the Dormitory windows, recommending the Board to appoint a paid Warden as he could not depend on any of the paupers there.

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, or, Orders made on them respectively, as follows:—

One from the Poor Law Commissioners dated 8th Sept. 1848 with reference to the sale of standing corn, for Poor Rates by Thomas Molaw Collector, at which the Master of the Workhouse attended as a purchaser, informing the Guardians that such sale was not in the power of the Collector to effect legally.

Also stating that if the sum, to be charged as interest, on the proposed Loan of £2000. shall exceed the sum to the credit of the Union for interest, the excess will be disallowed by the Auditor.

Mr Doyle's notice respecting the Duffry Street store, was ordered to be considered on Saturday the 16th Instant.

The following letter from the Treasurer was read—viz. My Lord.

M^{rs} Burke Poor Law Inspector having this day inspected the Workhouse of the Ennisceathy Union begs to state for the information of the Guardians.

1. That the Dining Hall was being cleansed up between 11 and 12 O'Clock. the door leading from it to the women's yard open and constant passing and repassing of the Female Inmates from the yard to the dining Hall kitchen &c going on.
2. The Laundry, women's day and Workroom all dirty, amongst other matters found in the women's day room were two small bottles which had recently contained Whiskey.
3. The Channel in the women's Apartment very offensive - was being swept - but apparently had not been so for some days.
4. The Matron absent as was stated on leave which

5. The Boys school noisy and in charge of one of the grown boys, it was stated the schoolmaster was gone down to the Templeshannon Ward but on Mr Burke going there immediately after the schoolmaster was not there.

6. The schoolmistress' bed room as dirty as it could well be.

7. The grounds about the Workhouse seem much neglected at the same time that not a man or boy were employed about them.

8. Mr Burke met an old man who got over the boundary wall going into town and whom Mr Burke called back when he was informed that he was a pauper inmate whom the Guardians had recently appointed at one shilling per day and rations as Wardmaster and superintendant of labour. Mr Burke having inquired what duties this man had to perform, was told that he had to walk down with the men and boys at night to the additional ward, and to keep the men at work during the day, the latter part of his duty must be a sinecure, there being no men at work, at all events, such an officer, now, that an additional Master has been appointed - is not at all necessary, and even if it was, this feeble old man, who until his appointment a couple of weeks ago, had been an inmate of the Workhouse, is quite unfit for the office.

9. Mr Burke most strongly impresses on the Guardians that unless they occasionally visit and inspect the Workhouse, matters in it must go on in anything but a satisfactory manner.

The consideration of Mr Burke's report was postponed until Saturday when a full Board was expected.

After the Chairman had signed the Cheques and orders the Board adjourned to Wednesday the 13th September 1848.

The Workhouse is not healthy and I do not think it will be so until all the Privies are put into an effective state. The sooner the Board would order this to be done the better. I think the Board might grant me a general power to make any sanitary arrangements which I may deem expedient, which will not involve expenditure, such as removal of nuisances, covering up dung heaps or their removal to a greater distance, the ordering of certain places or privies to be cleansed.

The manure heaps are too near the house and not sufficiently covered with clay to retain the Ammonia or unhealthy gas, this is more than usually requisite at present.

Should we succeed in enabling the inmates of this large Establishment to breathe a pure atmosphere the ensuing winter, yet still we should have a large amount of sickness whilst there are no means provided for washing and cleanliness which might be done at a trifling expense and would ultimately prove to be a saving in the prevention of epidemic and other diseases.

Ordered. to wait the result of putting covers on the privies.

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon, as follows:

The Master reported that the Buttermilk Contractor not having sent in his usual supply of milk the 11th Inst, he had to substitute for same about nine gallons of sweetmilk. That he had since however entered into an arrangement with the Contractor for a sufficient supply each evening for the following day and that he believed he would be regular in future.

The Committee appointed to consider the classification of Female Inmates. Reported that, that part of the Female Idiot Ward appropriated to the reception of improper female for a former occasion was well suited to the purpose but was at present occupied by the Nursery Women and children who had been most advantageously removed to make room for the Infant school but the apartment is too small for a Nursery and the Committee would therefore suggest that in any future buildings, provision be made for a commodious Nursery and the apartment now so used be restored to its former use for the better classification of the female pauper, until such a Nursery be provided, they do not see how such classification can be carried out.

The Master

The Master does not complain of any present difficulty but apprehends much inconvenience from an increase of female character of an improper description when the house becomes thronged.

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, (or, Orders made on them respectively, as follows:)

1. One from the P.L. Commissioners, dated 9th Sept. 48. No 119. 184 with reference to the chargeability of B. Rigley and family from which it appeared that the chargeability of his wife and her illegitimate children must be that of her husband.
2. Another from same dated 15th Sept. 1848. No 718, inclosing a form of Return of the state of the Insurances on the Workhouse, requiring same to be filled up and laid before the Guardians for any directions they may have to make, a copy of which should be inserted on the return previous to transmitting it to the Commis.
3. Another from same dated 14th Sept. 1848 No 713 requiring to be furnished with a Return of the Valuations of each Electoral Division of the Union on an enclosed form.
4. Another from same dated 14th September 48. No 714 with reference to the Balances in hands of Treasurer of Relief Committee, enquiring whether they have been accounted for or handed over to the Guardians and that the particulars of same may be recorded on the Minutes of next Meeting.
5. Another from same dated 11th Sept. 48. No 45692, requesting to be furnished with a Return of all Cases of Immediate Liens against whom legal proceedings have been taken for recovery of their Rates and setting forth particulars of the same on the form of Return enclosed.

6. One from same dated 14th Sept. 48. No 47600, stating they had no objections to the proposal for providing a bedroom for the schoolmistress off the adjoining dormitory about 8 or 9 feet wide.
7. One from same dated 11 Sept. 48. No 48652, stating that the Guardians should call on J. Roche the collector to resign his office, that it is not desirable to continue him for the collection of the new Rate and that if he refuses to send in his resignation they will make out an order for his dismissal.
8. One from same dated 11th September 1848. No 48652 with reference to certain Adult Boys who are desirous to emigrate to the British Colonies requiring the attention of the Guardians to the 18th Section of the Act 6th and 7th Vict. Cap. 24. relating to Emigration, that if the Guardians are desirous to assist in this Emigration, the Commissioners will on receiving a Resolution to that effect, take the matter into consideration.
9. A report from Mr Burke Inspector dated 14th September Inst as copied on the Minutes of proceedings of 12th Inst, already sent to the Commissioners.

Upon Mr Burke's report being read the Chairman ordered, up the Master, Matron, schoolmaster and mistress who appearing before the Board been severally examined.

No 1. The Master explained that the breakfast hour has since he came to the house been for Adults Ten O'clock and over at Half past Ten O'clock. That Mr Burke was here at about Eleven O'clock by the Master's Watch. That the table had been washed and the offal being removed for that purpose, the door leading into the female Yard was open.

No 3. That the Channel is swept several times every day but the Paupers sometimes throw offensive matter at the head of the Channel instead of at the foot, the place appointed and that he has repeatedly punished them for same.

That he had finished the Whitewashing of the whole House, but found a great loss in the appearance of every thing for want of being painted. he considers the whole House requires painting and respectfully urges on the Board's attention, that the present weather ought not be allowed to pass without some being ordered.

The Clerk was directed to advertise for Tenders for painting the House with two substantial coats in Oil painting no spirits of Turpentine to be used in the composition.

The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board and directions given thereon, as follows:

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners were read.

One Dated 22nd September 1848 N^o 51748 with reference to the return of persons relieved out of the Workhouse from which it appeared that relief was given to 5 Cases under Sec 2. of the Irish Relief Extension Act. that as no order was in existence to authorise Out Door Relief under that Section the same was illegal and should be disallowed by the Auditor.

One from same dated 22nd September 1848 N^o 50224 in reference to the Resolution of the Board of Guardians, appointing Maurice Doyle as Wardsman to the Templeshannon Workhouse at a salary of £18.5. a year disapproving of such appointment.

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, (or, Orders made on them respectively, as follows:)

"and declining to recognise Doyle as an officer of the Union. they recommended advertising for a Wardsman at £10. per Annum. that the Schoolmaster might superintend the paupers going from and returning to the Workhouse, and requiring a more intelligent minute respecting the Emigration to the Colonies of paupers Carroll and Leary with their families."

Another from same dated 20th September 1848 N^o 50511 in reply to the Communication of the Clerk respecting the power possessed by the Board of Guardians or their Revisor to make certain alterations in the Valuation of Tithes in Templeshannon Division, and whether the proper course for a Ratepayer considering himself over valued was an appeal to the Quarter Sessions.

The Commissioners stated for the information of the Guardians that the Revisor is the proper person to make any alterations in the Valuation of the Union, and which he is expected to sustain on the hearing of an appeal that any party rated who considers himself aggrieved has the power of appeal to the Quarter Sessions.

Another from same dated 22nd September 1848 N^o 54748, with reference to the suggestions contained in the report of the Medical Officer of the 16th Inst and recommending their adoption by the Guardians.

One from the Commissioners of Health dated 18th September 1848. apprising the Guardians of the Temporary Fever Hospital necessary to be upheld in the Union, requiring the appointment of Medical officers to same - the fixing of their salaries and the payment of same by the Guardians.

One from the Central Board of Health dated 20th September 48 N^o 12,262 enclosing the copy of a letter received from Dr Stock respecting a Resolution of the Board of Guardians to Dissolve the Temporary Fever Hospital at Glenroche and in which the Board of Health recommend the keeping open of that Institution under present circumstances and that they shall cooperate with the Guardians in every practicable measure of economy at the earliest period consistent with safety to public health.

Collector Roche not having sent in his resignation the Board ordered that he be suspended and that the Clerk advertise for a Collector for that District at 6th in the E.

Ordered that Dr Stock be apprised that any communication respecting the duties of management of the Temporary Fever Hospital at Glenroche should pass thro the Clerk of the Union.

The consideration of the appointment of the Medical Officer to the Temporary Fever Hospital was ordered to take place on Saturday 30th Inst.

With reference to the Commissioners letter on the subject of five cases being returned as relieved under Sect. the 2nd of the Relief Extension Act. the Clerk was ordered to inquire into the matter from the Relieving Officer of Ballykirkhard and to ascertain if those cases should not properly be returned as under Sec 1 of the Act and report same to the Board on Saturday next.

= as far as practicable to co-operate with Boards of Guardians in closing ~~any~~ Hospital without risk to the public Health. Also acknowledging the receipt of the Clerk's Letter which explained on the part of the Board of Guardians that in the minute made respecting the sending of any new cases of Fever to the central Hospital of Enniscorthy the Guardians did not intend the closing of the Hospital at Glenroche but merely a trial for a short period and that if it were found inconvenient they would fall back on Glenroche Hospital and recommend its continuance. The Board of Health further stated therein that they approved of the views of the Guardians and allowed a month for trial.

The Report of the Visiting Committee was read, and Orders were made thereon as follows:

Visited the House this day at 12 o'clock noon. went thro the dining hall found all clean and correct in every aspect. On entering the mens yard I found a very offensive smell but on enquiring I ascertained it proceeded from the ground where the boys were employed removing the stuff taken from the cesspools — the privy in that yard improved considerably by being covered — went thro the Shoemakers and Taylors workrooms — the former told me he had room for more hands and as there is not enough to do the work. I would suggest the Board order the Master to have as many boys sent up as the shoemaker may require, went thro the infirmary, found it clean and well ventilated. 54 cases one only with premonitory symptoms of Fever, next came to the womans workroom — found all employed spinning wool and flax others at needle work for the house, next entered the infant female school examined them in their letters and altho some being two years in the house yet I found them so deficient, that the women in charge should get a severe reprimand for their negligence, I find in all cases, paupers are persons who cannot be trusted so as to get work done effectually, the children under the immediate tuition of the schoolmistress answered on examining them — satisfactorily, & the school orderly, went thro the boys school and found a considerable improvement since my last visit — yet room for a great deal more.

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, (or, Orders made on them respectively, as follows:)

One from the Poor Law Commissioners stating they had under consideration a Minute of the Board of Guardians of this Union on the 30th ultimo relative to the appointment of a Wardmistress for the Auxiliary Workhouse in Templeshannon in which the Guardians state their opinion that a Wardmistress would not be competent to protect the property there and that it was more advisable to appoint a Wardmaster.

In reply the letter stated that it appearing there are no persons at Templeshannon Ward during the day but Inform Women who alone it is intended should receive their meals there - the Commissioners are still of Opinion that a competent Wardmistress not selected from the inmates should be advertised for at a salary of £10. and Rations. That they could not sanction the appointment of a Wardmaster under the circumstances, that as the men and boys only sleep there, the Assistant Master should accompany the men and the Schoolmaster the boys when going from and returning to the Workhouse, and that both officers should be required to sleep at the Templeshannon Ward.

One from the Central Board of Health dated 12th Oct 1848. N^o 13325. enclosing a copy of a Minute of the Board relative to the amount of remuneration to be allowed to Medical Officers under 12th vic Cap 131. and requesting

in accordance with the 4th section of the Act. the Board of Guardians will fix the remuneration at 5/- per day in accordance with the views contained in that Minute.

A copy of a letter addressed by the Central Board of Health to the Medical Officer of the Killan Temporary Fever Hospital dated 11th October 1848 No 12849. acknowledging the Receipt of a letter from that Officer relative to the admission of patients into the Temporary Fever Hospital there and in reply informing him that he should receive fit applicants into that Hospital until the Central Board of Health otherwise advised.

A Notice of Marriage was read by the Clerk between George Pepper and Anne Sealbrook both of Ennis-Corthy.

Ordered that a Wardmistress be advertised for on the terms proposed in the Commissioners letter read to day namely £10. per annum and Rations.

Ordered that the allowance hitherto granted of one shilling per week to pay for an assistant to each Relieving Officer in the distribution of Meal be discontinued until further orders.

Ordered that the Name Rev. Mr. Armstrong be substituted for that of Rev. Mr. Darnley on the Committee appointed last Saturday for superintendence of the Out-door Fever Hospital.

Ordered that the Clerk communicate with Mr. Burke as to the mode of payment of Fever Estimate subsequent to the 5th September last a difficulty having arisen as to the propriety of paying the Newtown Barry Fever Estimate altho signed by three of the Committee recently appointed under the 11th and 12th vic. Cap 131.

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year).

In reference to the letter received from the Board of Health dated 12th. Inst the Board of Guardians are unanimously of opinion that when it is considered, that the Medical Officers of the Dispensaries accepted their appointments at a certain salary without any reference to future emoluments as to Fever Hospitals, the sum of 5/- per day suggested by the Board of Health for their attendance on Fever Cases is too high in addition to their salaries as Dispensary Physicians.

It being represented to the Board by the Guardians of the Kilcommock Electoral Division that there were two boilers set up at two stations there under the late Relief Committee of that Division which were never removed and that they were in unsafe places they stated also that they were willing to take charge of those boilers until further orders from the Board respecting them. Upon which the Chairman made an order directing the parties in whose possession they are to give them up to the Guardians of that Division.

Tenders for a Collector for the Enniscorthy Division in room of Michael Doran resigned were opened and read - the Candidates who came to the poll were Samuel J. White and James Middleton and after consideration the Chairman proceeded to take the votes of the Guardians for each upon which it appeared that, S. J. White had 18, and J. Middleton 10 votes and the Chairman declared Mr White to be duly elected.

His Bonds were ordered to be perfected on Monday next.

The Master laid the account of stock at the Templebarrow Ward before the Board as ordered last day of meeting -

He pleaded that when going out he did not intend to stop but half an hour with a friend who was in town at Quarter Sessions, but that afterwards he induced him to stop too long that it was the first offence and certainly should be the last.

On consideration the Board pardoned him this time with a severe reprimand and that a repetition of such conduct would cause dismissal, the more so as the day he absented himself was a Board-day.

The Clerk was directed to advertise for material to make about 300. check bills for consideration on Saturday next.

Paupers Canoll and Leacy applied to the Board to be sent out as soon as possible as a consent of a majority of the Guardians to the extent of 2/3rd as required by the act was obtained. The Chairman sent for the Shipping Agent Mr Devoreux who stated that the Liverpool Company for whom he acted were not at present sending vessels out to the British Colonies but promised to write to other parties there, and to communicate the result of his enquiries to the Board as soon as he has a reply. -

The Chairman signed the cheques as recommended by the Finance Committee and the Board then adjourned to Tuesday the 17th October 1848. -
