The Out-door Relief Register was produced, examined, and authenticated from No. 6773 to No. 6797, inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman and countersignature of the Clerk.

Master's Report, The Master reported that two females were sent in for lodging on Saturday Night by J. Bennett Relieving Officer and that after leaving on Sunday Morning they were detected by the Police with part of a Union Shirt, He examined the Probation Ward and found the other part, He thought it would be difficult to keep up

The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board, and directions given thereon, as follows:

The Stock of Clothing if they can be carried out thro the Porten Hall without being detected,

Ordered, The Master has Authority over the Ports and if he neglects his duties he will be punished according to circumstances.

A Letter dated 13 August 1849 No 52210 — In reference to the proceedings adopted by the Union Solicitor in the case of John Roche defaulting Rate Collector and requesting that the Guardians will have the goodships inform them as to the nature of those proceedings,

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, or, Orders made on them respectively, as follows:

Ordered, That the Clerk communicate with the Solicitor who is now in Dublin and forward his answer.

A Circular Letter dated 15th Aug: 1849 No 520, In reference to the Moities or Sums lodged with the Treasurers out of any new Rates made towards defraying the Rate in Aid of any Electoral Division to the close of the 4th Inst. — the total of such Moities — and the total paid into the Bank of Ireland to the credit of the general Rate in Aid Account,

A Letter dated 16th August 1849 No 52210 In reference to a Complaint of a Neglect of Duty on the part of Mr Kinsella Rate Collector by Mr Conovan, requesting to be informed whether Mr Kinsella attended on the 11th Inst. as directed and if so in what manner was the Conovans Complaint disposed of

Ordered, The Collector Kinsella attended the Meeting of the Guardians with Mr Pean on whose part Mr Conovan had charged him with

Neglect of duty in Collection of the Rate of 1847 on the lands of Kilmallock — On hearing the case — the Board considered that the Matter did not require their intervention but referred the Collector to his Manual of instruction on the matter and made no order,

A Letter dated 17th August 1849 No 53412, transmitting a copy of a Constabulary report relative to the execution of fifteen persons from the lands of Ballyearney in which it is stated that the notice required by the Act 11th 12th Vic. Cap 47 was not served on the Relieving officer of the District, The Commissioners further state that it is optional with the Guardians to see for the penalty under that Act whether the parties existed have applied for Relief or otherwise —

The Board considered it inadvisable to see for penalties under the Act now if the parties existed having made application for Relief

A Letter from the Colonial Immigration Office dated 11 August 1849 — Stating that they are only authorized to grant passages to Wives and Children of Convicts when the sanction of the Secretary for the Colonies has been previously obtained in each case, that if sanctioned the Guardians may send out the parties provided they pay £7. 10 for each person of 14 years and upward, half that sum for Children — be sent to the port of embarkation, viz — London or Plymouth at the cost of the

Guardians and are provided with the Outfit required by the regulations: further that the Commissioners would not be able to take out the 18 boys alluded to in the application.

That such sum cannot be paid and that the Medical Officer should send forward the accounts for payment after having passed the Hospital Committee as is done by the Medical Officers at Ennis-Corothy and Culcut.

Mr. Wallace having made a Verbal Statement to the Board with reference to an overcharge of Rate, from an error in his Valuation on a Turbary and having signified his intention of opposing the Collection of the Rate in his case as far as the law will admit it was Resolved

That he be required to put his Statement in Writing and lay the same before the Board on next Saturday, that the Reviewer be required to attend and testify before the Board as to the equity of Mr. Wallace's claim for a reduction of the Rate made in 1848, with the view of laying same before the Commissioners and that the Collector be instructed that he is not required to collect the Rate in question viz No 829 in Templechambo until required by the Board.

The Master being called up the foregoing Resolution was read to him.

Resolved for the erection of additional Buildings as advantages for them offered and considered and that from Mr William Bates of Limerick was accepted on the following terms: For one wing as per sections, Plans and Specifications of Geo Wilkinson Esq. Architect & the Commission, £1066.6.6 with the sum of £50 should any extra works be ordered by the Architect, or to complete both wings for double that sum, requiring no money until the roof be up - the first wing to be completed before the 1st Jan 1850 and completed by the Architect under a penalty of £20 a week.

Resolved for repairs on the Iron sheds as advantages for them considered and that from John Clifford accepted as per terms set forth for the sum of £13.10.0

On the application of the Agent the Board ordered that the Tanners Yard be subscribed for, for 1 year and that a cheque for £1 - be drawn for that purpose.

The Chairman then signed the Order & Cheques and the Board adjourned to Thursday the 21 August 1849

Ordered, That the two Schoolmistresses shall occupy the same apartment for the present and the Schoolmaster and boys be brought from Duffry Gate into the House.

The Chairman having read a Note from the Treasurer of the Oulart Union Hospital Committee stating that the Gory Board of Guardians were on next Saturday to consider a motion for giving up the Oulart Temporary Fever Hospital, stated that Dr Cartan was in Attendance and at his request would state to the Board the present Condition of that Hospital, and that of the District as regards fever. Dr Cartan having been called in stated, that at present the Hospital at Oulart was overcrowded, the number of beds is thirteen, the number of Patients made up yesterday morning was twenty — of these fifteen are from the Gory Union and five from the Ennis-corthy Union — the oldest Case in Hospital is Margaret Simott admitted July 31st, the greatest proportion of male patients has been of the Abolition during the last month, which leads Dr Cartan to apprehend that during the present busy season similar Cases may multiply — the Relaps of Fever now prevalent Typhoid or Spotted, the Hospital is now in excellent working order well supplied with clothing and necessaries and not likely to be attended with any additional outlay — as to the inconvenience, expense and probable danger of sending to Gory Hospital, the Patients belonging to that Union, Dr Cartan stated that six Patients in the Hospital at present belonging to the Townlands of Ballymahack and Ballyhubbock, more than 12 miles from Gory, are sent to the nearest Patients to Gory at present

in Hospital were from Mullamolin a distance of 8 miles, and the expense of Transit alone would equal the Cost of the Medical Officer Salary, Under the circumstances the Board request that Dr. Cartan will attend at Gory and make a similar Statement to the Board on Saturday next and that the Clerk send to the Board of Guardians a Copy of this Minute expressing the Anxiety of this Board that any alteration of present arrangements may not be made on hasty or insufficient grounds, that the divided expense is not very burdensome to either Union when compared to the amount of good and precaution to public health it affords, the Out-door Hospital has been established for more than 28 years and if now shut up has not the County resources to fall back on - and the present United Maintenance may not be easily re-established.

With reference to the additional Buildings the Guardians wish to know from the P.L. Commissioners what superintendence if any has been contemplated on their part during the progress of the work and if not would they sanction any reasonable expense by the Board for that purpose to a person approved of by them

The Chairman then examined the Relief Accounts, compared and Certified the Out-door Register, signed the Orders and Cheques after which the Board adjourned to Saturday the 25 August 1849

Doctor Hay also attended the Board and stated that on yesterday two cases were sent to the Dysentary Hospital in Guttle St by the Relieving Officer. that he was immediately in attendance — that Doctor Goodisson also attended. to both of whom it appeared doubtful whether the cases reported as Cholera were so. & under the circumstances did not give up the Hospital by removing the Dysentary patients until the Board met this day and that he awaited their instructions to do so.

Ordered. That the Hospital be ^{now} given up to Doctor O'Rourke to be used exclusively for Cholera Patients should it make progress in the town & that they do not believe Dr Hay acted other wise than under the influence of doubt in not giving possession of the Hospital yesterday & was therefore blameless.

Orders made on them respectively, as follows:

Please to have them ordered before the Board to be examined. Mary Kehoe purloined a tin of Miraboul & when asked about it told lies and gave evasions. Patrick Mullins absconded on Monday evening with the Union Clothing. I also found Munnica scaling the wall at the pump room into the Kitchen yard. In consequence of the clothes store being now overcrowded, I would suggest it might be allowed to remove a portion of them to the room over the Board Room.

These paupers were called up and Orders made. viz. Mary Kehoe being an able bodied young woman to go out and look for Earnest Work. Thomas Green in like manner & Martin Munnica's milk to be stopped for a week for scaling the wall. Information to be sworn respecting Patrick Mullins.

Commissioners Letters,

A letter dated 30th August 1849, no 56, 262, stating that they had written to Collectors Byrne, Tho. & Marby Nolan informing them that if the

outstanding balances in their districts were not collected and lodged immediately the Commissioners would consider the propriety of calling them to resign.

A Letter dated 31st August 1849 No 552/6 returning enclosed the 1st page of minutes of the Guardians for insertion of the minutes capable of being accommodated by the Workhouse and Auxiliary Ward, which had been omitted, and with reference to the Committee appointed by the Board for the Newtown Barry District to carry out the provisions of the Act 11/12 Ric Cap 123, stating that unless the Committee is constituted in accordance with the 1st Secⁿ of the Act they have no Authority to administer the powers given by the Act, the Guardians are authorised however under the regulation of the Board of Health to carry out such work as cleansing &c under the provision referred to. The Commissioners further request the attention of the Guardians to the observations contained in their Circular of the 22^d December 1848 and enclosed copies of same.

A Letter was read from the Manager of the National Bank stating that the London Board of Directors had granted an advance of 1000 £ to the Board of Guardians at 5 per cent on the condition that it be repaid out of the first lodgements when the new rate is in course of collection.

Resolved, That in accordance with the 12th & 13th Victoria Cap III, Sec 6 relating to the Certificate of Nuisances to be delivered by two Constables of the Constabulary force of the District to the Guardians of the Poor of the said District on the receipt of which, said Guardians ^{are} by said Act authorised to take proceedings for the abatement of such Nuisances and for the punishment of those committing or allowing them — the Police within the Union of Eccles as they are directed to visit and inspect such houses and premises as they shall have reason to suspect or may be informed shall contain Nuisances and immediately to furnish this Board with the necessary Certificates as required by said Act, to ground proceedings thereon. — That a copy of this Resolution be printed and forwarded by the Clerk to the several Police Stations within the Union.

A Letter from Doctor O'Rourke was read informing the Board that no new Case of Cholera had appeared since Wednesday last that he had on that day taken possession of the Hospital — that the two Cases before alluded to had died — that he had appointed two experienced Nurses at 10^{/-} a week each with Patients — that they were supplied with Coats, Candles, Soap &c from the Temporary Union Hospital

Ordered, that tenders be advertised for the erection of a Piggery — also putting up a flue and Bailer and for altering the present linn house at the Cottage on the grounds with a small shed and yard agreeably to specifications made out by Messrs. Maher & Doyle by next Saturday,

William O'Leary again enquired if the Commissioners had yet sanctioned his emigration to Canada and was informed it had not yet arrived.

Ordered, that the Maps in the Male and female Schools be got varnished & preserved.

Tenders for keeping all the Smith work of the House and all the implements of husbandry in repair for 12 months were considered and that from Thomas Bradford for the sum of £10 was accepted.

An Application was made by Mr. Deviney for Collector Byrne to assist him in recovering Rates due by an outgoing tenant Archely who had sufficient property in the County Carlow

Ordered — That Collector M. Byrne give assistance and attend at Quarter Sessions in the County Carlow at the expense of Mr. Deviney.

He was in collapse for 12 hours & without pulsation for 10 hours. refused to go to Hospital as his friends supposed he was dying. he submitted to the proper treatment & recovered. May I direct the attention of the Board to the fact that there is no provision made for out door treatment & only that I visited & prescribed for the latter case gratuitously the young man would not be living.

The Master Reported that the Matron presented to him on Thursday last a quilt lining which she got in female Idiot Ward in Mary Cross's Bed & on enquiry I found it was made of Cotton sheets the property of the Union & also that Mary Cross was seen sewing them together & told Bridget Moore to burn the brands. There was a deserted Infant found inside the Boundary Hall on Thursday Evening about 8 O'clock P.M. which had to be taken in.

The pauper Cross was called before the Board & the case investigated. Cross was reprimanded only being a cripple & supposed to have acted under the influence of a vicious sister who has since left the House.

Doctor McRourke. Reported that he regretted to state that since he last reported there were two cases of Cholera at Templeshannon, one died yesterday evening after 12 or 14 hours illness, the other is under treatment & is better this day. that he drew the attention of the Board to the necessity of having some provision made for treatment of Out Poor patients attacked with premonitory symptoms as in all cases prevention is better than cure but not having heard that such arrangements were made he again very respectfully but earnestly urged the matter on the attention of the Board: also the cleansing and whitewashing certain localities to create a feeling of confidence amongst the people.

The Agriculturist Reported. that on the 3rd Inst. one day after the great lightning he had the Glahs of 30 ridges of potatoes pulled & covered the ridges with fresh clay. many since examined them & find they are shewing symptoms of the disease more & more every day.

at present about one fifth are black and diseased. One third other ridges he cut the stalks quite close & covered them with fresh earth - these are as yet all safe, on six other ridges he did not touch the haulms & regretted to state the one half are already diseased. He sent down samples to the Board. He suggested that they should be either disposed of at once or pigs purchased to feed on them.

Ordered: one ridge to be dug, sorted & mixed with charred peat in a narrow pit. The remainder to be dug and sorted, the good ones sent to Market & the bad ones reserved for use of pigs.

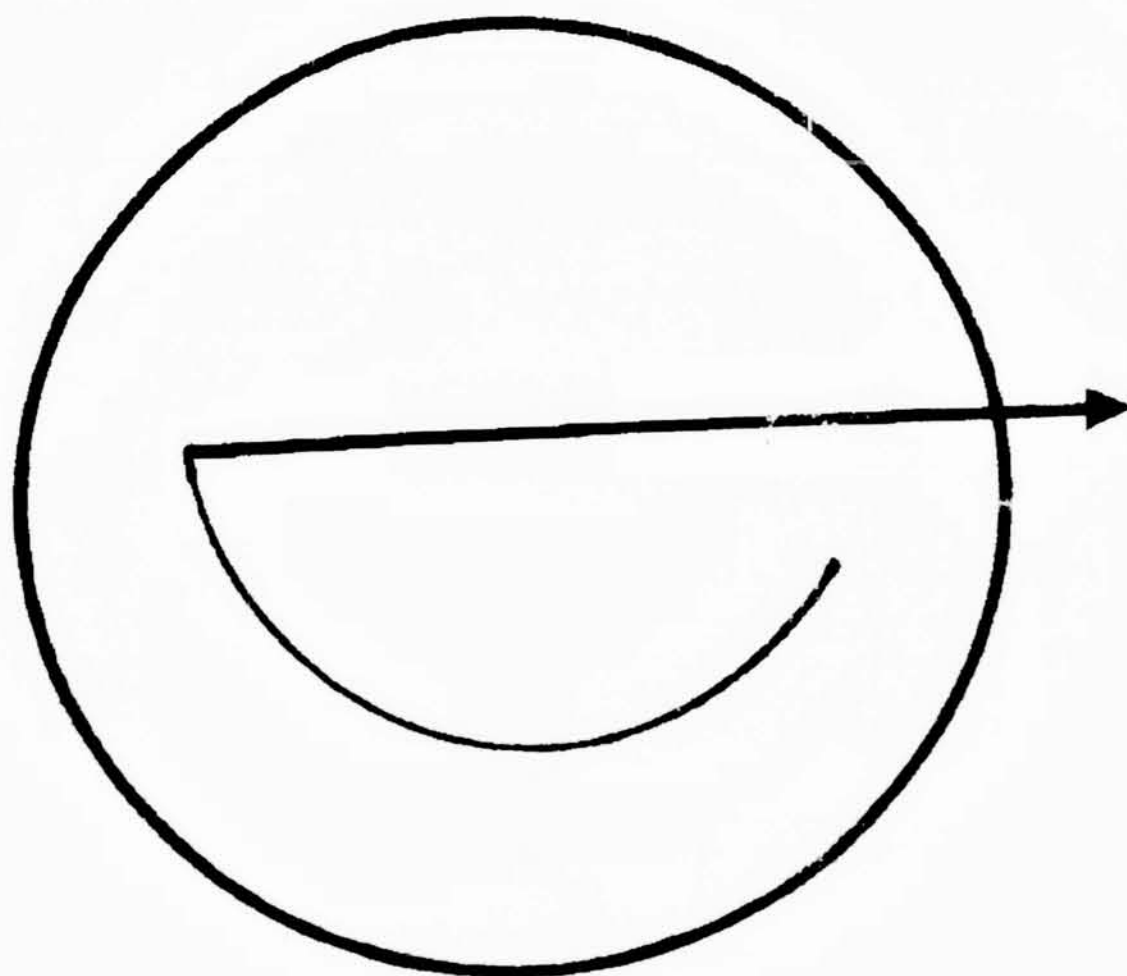
