The Agricultural Committee reported, your Committee have to report the existence of want of order in the accounts of the Farm, great difficulty arising in consequence in the checking of such accounts and your Committee would suggest that the Agriculturist be furnished with proper account books.

Your Committee find that accounts sent in by tradesmen for seeds do not state the quantity supplied. The cost of seeding 6 acres of ground under green crops appears excessive being £6.19.4 and we have ordered a more detailed account to be furnished, the food crop appears

A Letter dated 20th April 1850 no 20967, in reference to the resolution of the Guardians on the 15th Inst. directing that Catharine Phillips a pauper be discharged on the grounds of not belonging to Emmisworthy Union stating that the Guardians were not justified in giving such order on the grounds stated, as a pauper is entitled to relief in the Union in which destitution takes place, and moreover such discharge would cause the pauper to infringe the Vagrant Act and render the pauper liable if proceeded against for travelling.

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, for Orders made on them respectively, as follows:)

from one Union to another to a months imprisonment,

A Letter dated 25th April 1850 no 22246, respecting the chargeability of a pauper John Bolton and family inmates of the Workhouse, that under the circumstances stated in the Guardians minutes there was no doubt of the pauper being chargeable to the Emmisworthy Union that the fact of the pauper having been improperly charged hitherto was no reason the error should be perpetuated.

for the propriety and decency of a place of burial, that he had suggested scenes in a grave yard inclosed by a ditch and hedge as proposed by the Guardians sufficient to disgust any man, that they could not make a fence of that kind through which Pigs will ^{not} force their way, and if permitted to enter the disturbance of the dead cannot be prevented. But with this suggestion he would leave the matter in the hands of the Gentlemen of the Board.

Ordered, The expense of enclosing the cemetery with a wall 6 feet high to the road and with a ditch 6 feet wide with a Stone Back (quarried) will be about £500. Gates and Stone Posts included, forming altogether a perfect fence.

A Letter was read from Doctor Stewart to the following effect.

Sir

I have the kindness to express my feelings of Pride and gratitude to the Board for the distinguished compliment paid me by them for my late services during the prevalence of Cholera here and at St. George's Barr, conveyed by Mr. Kennedy in the most courteous manner.

This compliment I value the more knowing that your Board never accord their unanimous thanks to any of their paid officers unless well merited. I must say I could not deserve this high testimonial of their opinion for my zeal and ability if I were not assisted by the Board in carrying out the responsible duties entrusted to me but that the suggestions which I found necessary to make at various times were considered with a most earnest desire to cooperate and enable me to fulfil them to their satisfaction, my abilities they overrate but my zeal to relieve the suffering poor was as effective as it could be. It is charming in the extreme when responsible duties are discharged faithfully to find Gentlemen to appreciate them and give expression on their merits. How consoling it must be to the individual who experiences such noble conduct to find

lauded, it should make him doubly solicitous to merit such favours, I accept personally my sincere gratitude for your uniform attention and kindness to me with an ardent hope that the Epidemic may never visit us again and that I may be always found deserving the high opinion of the Guardians.

A Complaint was made by Matthew Lambert a poor man whose sheep had strayed on the lands of a defaulting rate payer of North against ^{collector} Martin Doyle for having seized and sold them by auction at the pound of Enniserry, that at the auction Lambert offered £2.11.0 for them which would have covered the rates and costs but that they were thrust down to a Mr. Shaw for £2.12.0 who would not give them to Lambert altho he offered him that sum for them, that the 3 sheep and three lambs were value for £6.10, that there was a large heap of dung on the premises belonging to the Defaulter which was not seized by the Collector.

Mr. Macdonnell was called up and examined on the part of Lambert and stated he went to Mr Doyle the Collector representing the hardship of the case and attended the auction when Lambert bid £2.11.0 that he thought it was a trick of the Bailiff who sold on the bidding of £2.12.0 by Mr. Shaw who was a grandson to the Pound Keeper and thus sacrificed them on Lambert.

M Doyle Collector was called up and stated that having frequently visited the property of the defaulting rate payer of North, he could find nothing on the lands save

A Complaint was made by Mr. Furmar against Edward Nolan the Station Barr Collector and Parry Nolan his Father collector for Kilrush to whom the Board lately gave the finishing of the collection of Timplashant during the absence of his other son Thomas Nolan the collector of that Division, that Edward Nolan had gone to the farm of J Summers in the Timplashant Division which had been in arrear owing to the desertion of the late occupier, that Somers then showed him an undertaking from Mr. Furmar to pay the rates and cess then (25th March) due on the lands, that E Nolan said that would do, that in a month afterwards on the 16th Inst and without demanding the Rates from Mr. Furmar he went to the lands of Somers and seized a steer in calf and a young horse and lodged them in the pound, that Somers at once went to Mr. Furmar and got a Note from Mr. Nico who acts in the office for him requesting Nolan to give

up the cattle but that Nolan would not do so.

Drury Nolan attended and stated that his son Edward had gone to Summers demanding the rates several times since he took the Farm from Mr. Furmar that he had not before seen the undertaking from Mr. Furmar to pay the rates until now shown to him. That on the night of the seizure between 10 & 11 O'clock Somers and four or five others came to his house most of his family being at the time in bed — that he then did see a note written that day by Mr. Hill but having the cattle under seizure did not think fit to give them up without payment of the Rates.

Somers and his brother attended and stated that Edward Nolan did not visit the lands but on the occasion when he was shown the undertaking and that he seized on the 16th Inst. without further notice and were now ready to pay the rates but would not submit to costs.

Ordered, That Edward Nolan should have made application to Mr. Furmar for the rates previous to the seizure that it was harsh and uncalled for without having done so. That on the payment of the rates now by Summers, he shall get a receipt from Nolan and that Nolan pay the costs of seizure and Impounding out of his own Pocket.

The Chairman reported that since the last meeting he had the pleasure of an interview with Mr. Purdie Inspector, in Dublin, that Mr. Purdie expressed his gratification generally on the conduct of the Union and particularly that of the Farm had shown a fair Balance in favor after deducting the necessary charges of the Union. Mr. Kunder promised to attend and lay before the Committee any tenders he could get in the interim from parties willing to dispose of their fields contiguous to the grounds.

Doctor Carey of Newtownbury reported that the Bedding sent up by the Board during Cholera were now all washed and fit to be returned — That there were a few articles required for use in the Infirmary Hospital and wished to know if he might keep them.

Ordered, That the Dray and cart be sent for the clothing to Mr. J. Purdie and that the articles required for the Hospital may be kept for use there by the Doctor.

A Letter was read from Captain Robert Owen of Millmount Gorey complaining of an arrear of £8.3.4 having been left uncollected on the lands of Clonmore Division of Ballyhustard last year, that he was now applied to by the Collector May for payment of some £20 due on those lands got up from a defaulting tenant, that there was property sufficient on the lands for payment of the arrear previous to the late tenant quitting possession and asking for redress at the hands of the Board.

Ordered, That Thomas Ansell present Collector for Clonmore attend on Saturday next and explain to the Board why he allowed the arrear to accrue on Clonmore farm during his collection of that Division and that the Clerk write to Captain Owen stating

The Agriculturist reported several cases of disorderly conduct on the land such as getting the grounds and trespassing on Mr. Founders land under several pretences that since the portable presses have been got on the land there is no reasonable excuse to leave the grounds, this was not the first offence.

Ordered. That the ^{right} able-bodied females now examined be punished by stoppage of mill for a week and to work an extra hour during that time, and the two able-bodied men Murphy and Spill to be discharged the House for idleness and refusing to work in the days allotted them.

Andrew Redmond was brought up by Mr. Langton Relieving officer claiming admission to the Workhouse, it appeared his wife and family attho in no employment outside would not come to the House with him, he stated he was unable to work and on examination it was found he had a very sore leg. The Relieving officer stated that the applicants wife and family would not come to the Workhouse with him. The Board decided on his admission the Majority was against and the applicant was rejected. at the same time the Board request the Commissioners to inform them in what case is it allowable to admit the Husband without the wife and family.

Several young persons having been brought forward for admission from time to time represented as 15 years old and on investigation it not appearing satisfactory that those children were so aged and that the Relieving officer had not used due diligence in obtaining sufficient information in the point for the Board - It was ordered That any Relieving officer who does not obtain

full information in doubtful cases of children being of the age of 15 shall be reported to the Commissioners.

Ordered, That Mr. Fitzpatrick and Mr. O'Brien make the necessary inquiries as to whether Michael O'Leary an applicant for admission to relief today has land or not.

The Assistant Master reported, that the Master was still in Fever but better, that the schoolmaster had been by the direction of the Medical officer sent to Fever Hospital yesterday and that the assistant schoolmaster was ill but not of decided Fever, that he had placed two men in charge of the school, one of them a Schoolmaster Driscoll admitted last week who he thought was capable and that Discipline and order were undisturbed.

The Chairman then signed the orders and Cheques, examined the relief Books and signed the out door Register after which the Board adjourned to Saturday the 25th May 1850.
