There were only 18 pupils present when I entered - of these 15 were in class I. The teacher states that the remainder of the pupils were engaged at out door work on the farm. This appears to be an injudicious arrangement and must interfere with their literary proficiency - a certain definite time in the mornings or evenings before or after the ordinary school hours might be set apart for this, what may be termed extra work.

Pennmanship appears to be pretty well attended to - the copies are uniformly neat & clear and the writing plain & legible although as yet wanting finish.

The picture tablets furnished from the apparatus department should be suspended in an orderly manner on the schoolroom walls - tablet railing being provided for this purpose.

Large maps of the World, and British Isles are required - 10 learning to spell & card - 12 engaged on the farm on today.

Ordered. - No alteration has been made in the hours from 10 to One O'clock in School and there was no boy employed on the land at the time of the Inspector's visit - they having refused the Schoolmaster to attend School.

# Ordinary Proceedings

The Board proceeded with the consideration of claims for relief in the Workhouse and Fever Hospitals of the Union also to Out door relief.

The case of chargeability of Mary Tibbles and child having been investigated she was ordered to be discharged from Wellingtonham & to be admitted on the Division of Marshalstown.

The Clerk having stated that there was no wine - Coffins or shrouding contracted for the Fever Hospital at St Barry he was directed to send placards there inviting tenders for those articles.

A Letter was read from Mr. W. Mahon stating that he had presented the Petition from the Board of Guardians against the Tithes and Markets Bill - that he was glad that the Guardians had taken up the matter so warmly as the Bill will inflict if it passes in its present form - serious injury on all persons interested in agriculture in Ireland - that having opposed the Bill from the beginning and when he could not know that he would be supported by any body in the County - he need not add that he will now more resolutely resist its progress.

A Tender to build a wall between the Hospital Field and the Fever Hospital - removing the present fence agreeably to Specification - at the rate of 3/8<sup>rs</sup> per Irish perch - was accepted from Martin Doyle - Sureties Messrs. Patrick Ryan and Joseph Ralph.

Tenders for Leather were then opened and Samples viewed by the Guardians and the following accepted -
