A Memorial from seven rate-payers in the division of Imbraek was read against the continuance of two shillings a week out door relief to John Shurphy of Ballybry aged 68 - this stood over for consideration until the Guardian of the division was present. Mr. Mill stated to the Board the whole case and the state of John Shurphy as an infirm - aged man living with a sister who attends to him - and after mature consideration the Board ordered that the relief be continued.

An Application for clothing to leave the House was made by Anne Murphy who was admitted from near Oulart and was offered a situation at the place she formerly lived. She, however not having appeared eligible - the Board postponed granting clothing until the Guardian for Ballybry would be present.

Tenders to supply Oils, Colours, Dyestuffs, Brushes of all kinds, shoe findings, thread, tapes, Cordage, Linen, spuns &c were accepted from Messrs. Patrick Green and Patrick Ryan - but the prices marked on copies of each tender by the Chairman who initialled each article accepted and which on reference thereto may be seen - all the sheets being marked 1 and 2 A and B. The Clerk to send copies of the articles and prices contracted for to both parties.

The Chairman then signed the Orders and Cheques after which the Board separated.

Master's Report

The Contractor has commenced to build the wall at Poor Hospital. The Master caused him to clean out the old fence about 2 feet below the level of the surface in order to procure a good foundation as the subsoil is of a soft porous nature and would not be capable of bearing up the wall unless it was sunk to the proper depth. Doctor Cromwell has very kindly allowed the use of nearly a perch wide of his land the whole length of the fence for the purpose of delivering the stones and mortar thereon for the use of the wall.

He has completed sowing the Marigold crop in all about 8 statute acres most part of which are over ground and the young plants are looking strong and healthy. There is yet about 1/2 acre to be sown with Turnips which he expects to have completed by the end of the week. He had been somewhat later this

year than usual owing to the continuous rain during the early part of the season.

The wheat crop about 102 acres is most promising — from its present appearance there is every prospect of an abundant crop.

A Schoolboy named John Burn complained to him of his head having been cut by the Schoolmaster — on examination he found that the boy's head was cut but on further enquiry it appeared it was caused by a fall and not by the Schoolmaster. The boy ought to be punished for telling the lie.

One of the metal window sashes in the wall of the Coal House adjoining the boys yard has been broken — on enquiry he found that Burn was seen throwing stones at it.

He begged to lay before the Board a set of Chemical apparatus which was procured for the use of the School some time ago — on consulting the Medical Officer he found that the Liquid contains more or less of poison and consequently refused giving them up to the Schoolmaster without the sanction of the Board.

During the admission Mary West of Coolatore appeared before the Board claiming admission to the Workhouse on behalf of two children William Whelan aged 8 and sister Margaret aged 5 whose mother Eliza Whelan died about a fortnight since and whose father James a few days after his wife's death deserted the children. The Board admitted the children to the Workhouse and directed that the statement of Mary West be taken down and placed on the minutes viz. - That James and Eliza Whelan the parents of those children were tenor to to her husband for the last three years - about 7 weeks ago Eliza took ill with dysentery having been previously of scrupulous disposition. Mary West the motives of humanity alone attended Mr. Eliza Whelan for the last 5 or 6 weeks. That after being a week ill Doctor Taylor of Berne visited on a Dispensary ticket and prescribed for Mr. Whelan occasionally sending her medicine. He did not however visit her again for a month and only when she was within an hour or two of her death and that visit was made from the doctors having received a ticket marked urgent from the Relieving Officer as she heard and which is now confirmed by the Relieving Officer himself.

The Board wish to make enquiry of the P. & L. Commissioners whether it was the duty of the Medical Officer to attend continuously during the illness of Mr. Whelan or not - and whether it was the duty of the Medical Officer to give a certificate to the husband for the purpose of obtaining admission to the Workhouse Infirmary when requested to do so by the Guardian

of the Division who did so on part of the Board in accordance with a Resolution of the Guardians dated 20th July 1861, a copy of which was duly sent to Doctor Taylor,

Emma Birman an inmate going out to service was allowed clothing to the value of Fifteen shillings.

A Memorial from Ratepayers of the Kilrush Electoral Division was read stating that a girl Margaret Lacey whose illegitimate child had been left at Martin Douglas of Bolineaharry - had then deserted the child - that his son was the reputed father and well able to support the child - but that the father brought it to the Workhouse - and produced to the Master an Affidavit of its desertion by the mother and complained that the child should not have been admitted.

Ordered. The Master produced the Affidavit of desertion and the child was admitted chargeable to the Union and not to Kilrush - the Master is now directed to lodge an information against the mother for desertion.

A Letter was read from the Treasurer informing the Board that the advance of £1000. until the beginning of September next has been sanctioned by the Board of Directors in London upon the new rate being struck and the usual guarantee for interest on the advance at 5 per cent being given by the Guardians.
