

Subsequently the Clerk was informed that Doctor Sheridan refused to act and that in consequence Doctor Gooderson consented to act and of which Dr. Gifford was duly informed by the Clerk.

The Roberts then brought under the Notice of the Board the further Consideration of the Case of Susan Wilkinson. Edward Leeson was again brought before the Board and some additional questions put to him and some explanations given on points not clearly settled on last Board day. The Child Susan Wilkinson was then brought up and questioned after which the Board ordered that the whole be recorded on the Minutes of this day in the Books in which they were taken down — viz

Edward Leeson was called up and examined. He stated that Susan Wilkinson is a Niece of his by the Mother line at Clonroche about the year 1853 thinks it was that year. The Child's mother lived with him at that time and she was married to John Wilkinson who had emigrated to America soon after being married. thinks Wilkinson was in America 12 months less at the time the Child was born. thinks the Child's father is John Wilkinson. He afterwards sent money to his wife Ruth who came to America when the Child was about 15 months old. When leaving she gave the Child into E. Leeson's custody and that of the Child's Grand mother who lived with him at the time and had a small annuity of £5 a year from the late Lord Carney and who lived about 12 months after the Child's mother emigrated. Leeson took care of the Child afterwards. He got £1 assistance from the master soon after she left, since that he got £2 from her in about 6 months after the first remittance. The next money he got was in about 6 months £2, the next was also £2 in another half year. The next remittance was to the best of his belief also £2 — thinks it was 19 months after. Thinks he got afterwards £1 in another 12 months. After that he wrote to his sister for money several times but got no answer nor money sent to the trouble of writing to their parish Minister in America but got no reply. He had the Child at Nurse with Mary Costains who lived in Clonroche and who was a distant relative of the Child. He paid her 1/6 a week for its Maintenance and Care, was paying her for a period of 6 months, and then got tired of it — was not able to continue paying her and consider it cheaper to take the Child to himself. He had her for about 12 months, then when he put her into the W.House, some of her relations proposed to take charge of her before bringing her to the W.House. In about 6 months he took the Child out himself and in a few weeks the Aunt Hawkins offered to take her and did take the Child to the Country. In 6 months time he went to see the Child and found her as he thought in a very bad state as to food and clothing. The Child clinging to him and begged him to take her with him, he brought her to Enniscorthy and kept her about 2 months ✓

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election)

Made a very peaceful illness in Hopking Lodge. Doctor Gooderson visited the Child and he then put her finally into the W.House on the 16<sup>th</sup> November 1859 when she now is. The Religion of the Father and Mother was protestant, when the Child was admitted to the W.House in 1859 her wife came with her and had her registered a Catholic. States he was at that time and for 12 mos previously a Catholic. That the Child at the time of admission was not baptised by a Catholic Clergyman but was baptised by the Protestant Clergyman soon after its birth. Is not aware whether or not the Child has been baptised by a Catholic Clergyman — believes the Child goes to the Catholic Chapel at present; saw her today; asked her yesterday would she wish to go to America to her parents who had sent for her. She answered that she was afraid to cross the Water. He said her father and mother had crossed the ~~water~~ sea wishing not to see her on that point. Did not in any letters he wrote the parents ever mention the change of faith of the Child. He was so long without hearing from them he did not know whether they were dead or alive. Leeson too, ~~had~~ shown the signature to the power of Attorney sent from America to Mr. Roberts and the letter sent by John & Ruth Wilkinson to the Guardians both of which he stated to be in his Sister's handwriting. At this stage of the inquiry it was adjourned to next Board day 14<sup>th</sup> February.

Having been further examined on this day Saturday the 14<sup>th</sup> February Edward Leeson stated that John & Ruth Wilkinson lived with the Rev<sup>d</sup> Mr Alexander and wife married in the Church of Carne by that Clergyman. He was present at the marriage, they lived together about 3 months after marriage when John Wilkinson went to America. The Child was born about 9 months after the father left the Country. The Child was baptised in Clonroche in the House where he (Leeson) lived, by the Rev<sup>d</sup> Mr O'Brien. He believes as to the parentage of the Child that the lawful father of it is John Wilkinson. States further that he has no objection that the Child be sent to her parents in America.

The Child Susan Wilkinson was then brought up and examined. By the Register she appeared to be between 11 and 12 years old. She was asked would she wish to go to her parents in America. She answered that she was afraid to cross the Sea, but if she got safely she would like to go and that she would accompany her Uncle and Aunt <sup>if</sup> they were going. Being asked her Religion she stated she was a Catholic but she was once a Protestant.

The Register was then examined as to the different admissions of the Child when the following appeared.

Her admission was into Town Hospital on the 18<sup>th</sup> September 1857 ✓

aged by years then Registered a Protestant, discharged  
the 12th October 1857. again admitted on the  
Emmiskey Division the 11th November 1858 and was

a Catholic.



During the admissions I am Necessar a married woman in ill health desire to be admitted to Hospital and being known to some of the Guardians she was admitted, but on the question of Chargeability there was difference of opinion upon which the Board desired her case to go on the Minutes for decision by the Commissioners.

I am Necessar aged 32 married — She and her husband were dealers — attending Fairs and Markets for the last Seven years in the Counties of Wexford Wicklow and Carlow, they were once during that period in Dublin for a week and at another time for 3 weeks, Her husband is now in one of the City Hospitals. When they returned from these Fairs in those Counties they stopped at her father's House in Enniscorthy who made no charge for their lodgings during the period above stated.

In examining into the State of the Collector's Accounts the Board ordered —

That the Collectors furnish lists of the Ten highest rate payers now in arrear in each Division and that they do attend with their Books for inspection by the Board on the day fortnight,

Mr McDaniel Schoolmaster stated that he was about applying for the Office of Master to the Castletown Union and would thank the Board for a Testimonial.
