That he had attended at Outlet Dever Hospital yesterday for the purpose of taking Stock of Clothing &c in that establishment which he found correct & the Hospital in good Order and the Clothing in good condition. He would suggest for the consideration of the Board the necessity of having a separate Room for male & female Patients which can be had by putting up a fire place in a room which is at present unoccupied formerly used as a Dispensary. It would also be necessary to erect a second privy. There has been no patient in the Hospital since the 3rd December last regnides a fire place.

The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board, and directions given thereon, as follows:—

He omitted to state when reporting on Mr Barry's Report that there was a quantity of manure there that might be sold.

The Agriculturist is absent since this day week. On enquiry he said he was ill but received no official report from himself.

An inmate named Anne Tracy deliberated broke 16 panes of glass in the windows of the female Hall on Thursday night whilst the other inmates were at prayers. He had informations sworn against her. She was committed to Bridewell to be tried on Monday next. The reason she assigned was on account of being discharged from the Infirmary.

He submitted a list of clothing material asked for by the Matron by - 14 Counterpanes as those made in the House 8 or 12 years ago are now quite worn out - also 500 yards of linen for shirts & shifts - that this material was badly wanted as there is not a charge for the inmates.

Ordered. Referred to a Committee consisting of Messrs Roberts, Horne Cullen, Mr. Smith who promised to meet at the Workhouse on Tuesday at 12 O'clock to examine and report on the necessity for this clothing.

In reference to your communication of the 23rd ult^r I beg to say that I brought the contents under the notice of the Hospital Committee at its last meeting and I have now to say for the information of the Guardians. That some of the Window Sills in the upper room are decayed and want repairs and that some whitewashing will be required when the weather becomes fit for it when the Master visited there were but three patients in the Hospital a Policeman and two females and while matters continue in that state a second room can be appropriated for a day room but that will reduce the accommodation for patients to seven male and seven female patients.

The Master was sufficiently reinforced as to the quantity of fuel allowed as the supply has

no limit and the Doctor Orders it whenever it is asked for and the want of fire on the occasion referred to was the fault of the Nurse.

Where a door has no lock it is furnished with sufficient Dry Bolts but a few locks can be easily procured. It might be better to seek for a Plan & Specification for those matters & approved of by the Guardians.

I have received instructions from the Board
of Guardians to write to you with reference to the Ejectment
at suit of Mr Hale Dane and others for recovery of the
possession of N Y Barn Farm Hospital. The Board
having been glad to understand by Messrs Corcoran
and Roberts that you mentioned Mr Hale Dane's willing-
ness to give a lease for ever of the Hospital at £1 a year,
I am authorized to state that for Peace Sake and to end
litigation these terms will be accepted, and as this
Hospital has been maintained chiefly in the interests
of the tenantly on Mr Hale Dane's estate it would seem
strange indeed in him to seek to deprive them of the benefit
of it even if he had the legal title to the possession.
But I presume he cannot be fully cognizant of the
rights of the Guardians which are founded on the undis-
puted Ownership of the land being in them or in the Grand
Jury as Trustees for the Public since the erection of the
Hospital thereon. The Hospital was built upwards of
