That he had completed the Return of Income of all classes & forwarded same to the Commissioners as per form set forth in his Journal.  
That he had attended at Oulart Dews Hospital yesterday for the purpose of taking stock of clothing in that Establishment which he found correct & the Hospital in good order and the clothing in good condition. He would suggest for the consideration of the Board the necessity of having a separate dayroom for male & female Patients which can be had by putting up a partition in a room which is at present unoccupied formerly used as a Dispensary. It would also be necessary to erect a second privy. There has been no patient in the Hospital since the 3<sup>rd</sup> December last requires a privy.



He omitted to state when reporting on Mr Barry's report that there was a quantity of produce there that might be sold.

The Agriculturist is absent since this day week on enquiring the Board he was ill but received no official report from himself.

An inmate named Anne Seacy deliberately broke 16 panes of glass in the windows of the female hall on Thursday night whilst the other inmates were at prayers. She had informations sworn against her. She was committed to Bridewell to be tried on Monday next. The reason she assigned was on account of being discharged from the Infirmary.

She submitted a list of clothing material asked for by the Matron viz - 141 Country perches as these made in the House 10 or 12 years ago are now quite worn out - also 500 yards of linen for shirts & shifts - that this material was badly wanted as there is not a change for the inmates.

Ordered. Referred to a Committee consisting of Messrs Roberts, Gore, Cullin, & Mr Smith who promised to meet at the Workhouse on Monday at 12 O'clock to examine and report on the necessity for this clothing.

#### Agriculturist's Report.

Visitors Book showed the following entry.

I visited the school and examined the boys in Catechism. There is evidently an improvement in their method of answering. The schoolroom is kept in good order and upon the whole I was very much pleased with the manner in which the Schoolmaster discharges his duties.

At T. Barry 4 March 1863.

Sir In reference to your communication of the 23<sup>rd</sup> ult. I beg to say that I brought the contents under the notice of the Hospital Committee at its last meeting and I have now to say for the information of the Guardians that some of the Window Sills in the upper room are decayed and want repairs and that some whitewashing will be required when the weather becomes fit for it. When the Master visited there were but three patients in the Hospital a Policeman and two females and while matters continue in that state a second room can be appropriated for a day room but that will reduce the accommodation for patients to seven male and seven female patients.

The Master was sufficiently informed as to the quantity of fuel allowed as the supply has

no limit and the Doctor Orders it whenever it is asked for and the want of fire on the occasion referred to was the fault of the House.

A Priz for the Nurses & female patients is desirable - it would be most suitably added to the present one and the separating wall raised higher and as the roof of the Old one is very bad it could be repaired at the same time.

Where a door has no lock it is furnished with sufficient Iron Bolts but a few locks can be easily procured. It might be better to seek for a Plan & Specification for those matters if approved of by the Guardians.

Ennisworthy 14 March 1863

Dear Sirs

I have received instructions from the Board of Guardians to write to you with reference to the Ejectment at suit of Mr. Hall Dane and others for recovery of the possession of St. Mary's Fever Hospital. The Board having been given to understand by Messrs. Corcoran and Roberts that you mentioned Mr. Hall Dane's willingness to give a lease for ever of the Hospital at 2/- a year, I am authorized to state that for peace sake and to avoid litigation these terms will be accepted, and as this Hospital has been maintained chiefly in the interests of the tenantry on Mr. Hall Dane's estate it would seem strange indeed in him to seek to deprive them of the benefit of it even if he had the legal title to the possession.

But I presume he cannot be fully cognizant of the rights of the Guardians which are founded on the undisputed ~~ownership~~ of the land being in them or in the Grand Jury as trustees for the Public since the erection of the Hospital thereon. The Hospital was built upwards of 40 years ago by grants from the Grand Jury and they private subscriptions, and from that period it has been held as public property free of any rent or adverse claim of title by any person whomsoever. Under these circumstances the Guardians consider an indefeasible title to the fee has been acquired and is now vested in them and acting as they are on behalf of the Ratepayers of this Union they conceive it is not unreasonable in the event of the proposed arrangement not being carried out by Mr. Hall Dane, to ask what are his supposed rights and to be furnished with the grounds upon which he rests his claim to reacquire these premises.

As the time for filing defence is now so limited I trust you will let me have your reply by return of post.
