Having been directed by the Guardians on last Board day to procure the Meat for Easter Dinner & have it cut up in proper time I was absent during the proceedings of the Board and regret to have heard on some day in the week that there was an entry made in the Minutes to the effect — that the Relief List was not filled up as to the number of days in the Address or Abstract of the weekly relief list for the half year ending 29<sup>th</sup> September 1863. This I positively deny without fear of contradiction as the aggregate number of days were properly brought forward from the Electoral Division list into the Abstract and which very plainly shows to any person who understands the Works that the Relief List & Abstract should be made up every week before he could close the Provision Cheell account and further he has to state that all the books were then and are now putted up in full. We therefore hoped

that the Board will be good enough to correct the statement,

A Lunatic named Stephen Byrne admitted on the 24<sup>th</sup> Inst. became violent and broke the window struck the Warden &c, He had him brought before the Magistrate yesterday who committed him to jail as a dangerous Lunatic,

There are two more female Lunatics named Margaret Connor & Eliza Cleary both admitted on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Inst. for whom it will be necessary to make application for admission into the Carlow Asylum

He describes the Workhouse as in fair average order - that the condition of the male Idiots is much improved since the appointment of a paid attendant - that he observed on the issue of meat to the mill in quarters and half pounds the meat is weighed raw and suggests that where a quarter of a pound is ordered it should be a quarter of a pound of cooked meat. That the Schools had made fair progress. He recommended washing the new Hospital and that some painting is required - also that several repairs were required at the Hospital in St. Parry and Culcut.

The Report of the Visiting Committee was read, and orders were made thereon as follows:—

### Medical Officers Report

That he found it his imperative duty to report the conduct of Anne Byrne for refusing to submit her child to medical treatment altho ill for 3 days before being reported to me and after the child being brought down by her was subsequently returned to the Infirmary by the Matron after two days, he could not remove the symptoms of fever but had to send the case to the Fever Hospital. If such irregularity contrary to the order of the Board made on the 29 March 1855, be allowed, it would be impossible to prevent the spread of fever thro the House.

He regretted to report a case of scarlatina occurring in a boy aged about 9 years who was admitted with his brother and had to be removed to Fever Hospital. The brother is not ill.

The case of concussion of the brain and injuries to the head caused by falling from a horse is progressing most favourably - altho the boy was unconscious and speechless for 40 days. He reported the death of eight inmates from various causes during the last week.

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon as follows:—

### Masters Report

The Pump is out of order, it will be necessary to adopt means to have a sufficient supply of water. He begged to say he had examined into the case of Alice Stephens as mentioned last Board day. She positively denies every statement with the exception of her arm having been a little hurt one day by accident. She further stated that the Nurse's men must kind to her on all occasions and that she would not be alive only for their attention.

Ordered. That Mary Stephens' statement be entered on the minutes - also Doctor Judson's statement.

May Stephens appeared before the Board on the 25<sup>th</sup> ulto and stated that she has a daughter in the Fever Hospital at Ennisceathy, she had

heard that her daughter had made complaints as to her treatment in Hospital, went to her daughter last Sunday. She told her that Nurse Purcell took a sponge she (the Nurse) had cleaned her bed sores & put it into her mouth to prevent her making a noise when in great pain. Her daughter complained to Nurse Slye that Nurse Purcell had turned her hand back and strained it, and that Mrs Slye went and reprimanded Nurse Purcell. That Nurse Murphy put her hand on her daughter's mouth to prevent her from making a noise when suffering from pain and that when her daughter required to be taken out of bed to have her sores washed both Purcell & Murphy took her out in a very rough manner and used to lay her down on the floor cold whilst rubbing her sores - one of them would hold her hand on her mouth while the other rubbed the sores. Mrs Mary Stephens further stated that she gave Nurses Purcell & Murphy two shillings in money and one shilling & three pence worth of Eggs & Tobacco from time to time in order to secure a better attendance on her daughter.

Julia Stephens sister to Alice stated she saw her mother give the Eggs to these Nurses. Her sister Alice told her that she believed it to be useless for her mother to give them anything as their treatment to her would not be bettered by it.

Doctor Judison's statement was as follows.

In reference to the <sup>Agriculturist's Report</sup> accusation made by Mary Stephens - mother to Alice - now a patient in the Deane Hospital - against Nurses Purcell & Murphy - he hoped to state that Alice Stephens told him in presence of the Master - that she had no complaint to make against any of the nurses and that she was kindly treated by them with exception of one occasion while dressing - she put down her hand and Nurse Purcell pushed it roughly away. She denies all the charges made by her mother. - He further stated that neither the Patient or any of her friends made any complaint to him.

## Agriculturist's Report

That he was employed during the past week ploughing & preparing the ground for Mangel.

The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board, and directions given thereon, as follows:—

Has disposed of all the Mangold and will require a pair of horses to cart the manure the morning next. We visited the House and the Infirmary and on our return to the Board room agreed to the following report. Explanation of Master's Clerk and Apprentices - not respecting a bill of labor for 18/- for labor done in the farm - a similar bill for that amount

Having been paid on the 22<sup>nd</sup> November last Master Clerk stated in writing as follows: Having been called before the Board on last Monday to explain why I attached the Master's signature to a Bill for labour amount 1<sup>st</sup> & dated 22 November last - a similar having been paid on that day. I beg to state that on Friday evening the 1<sup>st</sup> inst. Mr. Sommit Agriculturist came to the Master's Office & requested me to fill some Orders for Mangold which I did - He then left the Office and in a few minutes after I left to go home - leaving the key of the Office to Mr. Sommit returning towards 4 yards from the Office I met Mr. Sommit returning towards it. He said to me - "I want you to get out some Bills for one or two to that effect." I replied that it was now too late it will do on the morning - he said very well.

On coming to the Office on Saturday morning about 10 o'clock I found it open & afterwards heard that it had been opened by the Nation with the key of the bread store (which key opens the Master's Office) to allow a woman in to wash it out. I had been in the Office about 10 minutes when Mr. McDonald Schoolmaster came on - I believe about reporting some boys to the Master. He remained about 10 minutes and soon after he had left I proceeded to make out the Cash Bills and then perused the Bill for labour on the desk - but I cannot state positively that the Bill in question was there when I entered the Office. I took it up & signed it without looking at its date believing it to be correct in consequence of Mr. Sommit having stated to me on the previous evening that he had some Bills to make out & which I supposed were bills for payment by the Board and that this was one of them - Otherwise I would not have signed it until shown to the Master who was then absent on business at the Devon Hospital.

Agriculturist Statement

With regard to the Bill dated 22<sup>nd</sup> Nov<sup>r</sup> which went before the Board on last Saturday Mr. McDonald was kind enough to give me directions in drawing Bills - as I was not in the practice of doing so. He drew two Bills, I presented one of them - drew the cash & paid it. I thought the other was then or ~~was~~ at least ~~was~~ long since burned or torn as I am prepared to prove I never saw it nor handled it since. It is not likely it could be in the Master's Office on Friday night unknown to the Master by Duveroux and the Master Clerk and it is well known that I was not in the Office on Saturday until after the Bills left. I have to state in justice that the Bill
