Ordinary Proceedings

The Board proceeded to consider the applications for relief in the Workhouse & Poor Hospitals of the Union - also for out door relief in certain cases.

Messrs. Brune and Coopre submitted to the consideration of the Board cases that had been erroneously admitted in the divisions of Killingsham and Ballyhurkard. The former a case that had been admitted to out door relief charged to Killingsham which on investigation should have been placed on the Union. The latter a case in the Workhouse over the family admitted to out door relief in the division of Ballyhurkard - now found to be properly chargeable to the division of Bolaboy and they requested the Board to have the sums so charged to their accounts transferred to the proper accounts. The Master being asked could that be done - stated it could not. The Clerk being referred to stated it could if the Board made an order to have it done. The Commissioners are requested to give their opinion on such be done when it was begun & ended within the half year.

The Medical Officer was requested to report on next Board Day why the consumption of Whisky is increasing.

The Medical Officer of St. Barry Hospital stated in writing that the clothing for the patients then had not been sent to him - that the few they have they wear as they are unlabelled but that they required many different sizes.



Dated 27 July 1863 Acknowledging the receipt of list P. 14539 } of particulars regarding Bridget Hamilton whom the Guardians of Embsworth Union propose to assist in emigrating to New York — desiring to state that the necessary formal consent to the expenditure will be issued in usual course,

Sealed Order Consenting to the expenditure by the Dated 6 July 1863 Guardians of a sum not exceeding P. 14539 } Two Pounds & Fifteen Shillings to assist in defraying the expenses of the migration to New York of Bridget Hamilton — an inmate of this Workhouse chargeable to the Union at Large;

Dated 10 July 1863 Stating that they have had before them the Resolution of the Board of Guardians of this Union on the 4th instant relative to the religious Registry of a deserted infant about a fortnight old — found at the Workhouse gate in which the Guardians request that the Commissioners will state what course the Law directs in reference to the baptism & religious registration of the deserted Infant — desiring to state in reference thereto that

in a case like the present where nothing is known of the religion of the child's parents and no guardian Godfather or Godmother is known the child ought to have been registered by the master as of the Established Church.

Ordered. On reading the Commissioners Letter dated 10 July 1863 No. 4832 - as to the registration of the deserted infant called Thomas McDonnell - that being the surname of the person who found it (the Schoolmaster in this Workhouse) the Board sent for him and asked how would he take the guardianship of the child to which he consented and being himself of the Roman Catholic Religion the Board ordered that the child be registered accordingly - which being moved by Mr George O'Boyle & seconded by Mr Thomas Brophy was put from the Chair and passed with one dissenting voice - upon which the Chairman registered the infant a Roman Catholic.

Ordinary Proceedings

The Board proceeded to consider the claims of applicants for relief in the Workhouse and Poor Hospitals of the Union also to out door relief in certain cases.

Mr John Doyle Sr gave notice that he will move on this day fortnight that Margaret Whitty now placed on the Union at Large be called before the Board to ascertain her purpose characterability or otherwise appoint a Committee to examine her.

Ordered. That a special meeting of this Board be called for this day fortnight for the purpose of revising the out door relief lists and also to consider the advisability of giving out children to Nurses.
