# Ordinary Proceedings

The Board proceeded with the Consideration of claims for relief in the Workhouse and District Hospitals of the Union - also to out door relief in certain cases.

James Keely an inmate applied to the Board for clothing. His sister in Dublin had paid his fare to go up by the train - on examination into the case it was ordered, That James Keely be allowed clothing to the value of £1.0.0.

Patrick Ryan an inmate requested clothing to go out and on examination into his case the clothing was refused.

Margaret Long - an inmate requested clothing for herself and child 5 years old, to go out - on examination into her case the clothing was also refused.

Ellen Shannon - an inmate stated she had got an offer of a situation outside but wanted some articles of clothing - on examination into her case it was found that she would purchase what articles she wanted & which was granted.

An Application was made by one of the temporary Shoemakers employed at repairing the old shoes to be allowed to continue at work for some time longer.

Ordered. The period has expired for which he was engaged and the application is refused.

A letter was read<sup>11</sup> from Mr. Ansell - Meat Contractor asking the Board to allow him a reasonable price for the meat supplied on Easter Sunday.  
Ordered. The Board will allow him 3/ per lb the same as was ordered at Christmas.

An Application was made by Patrick Delany an inmate for clothing to enable him to go to his daughter in Liverpool - His letter to him was submitted to the Board and read.

Ordered. The Clerk to write to Ellen Delany of Liverpool asking what assistance she proposes to give towards the expenses in sending over her father from the Workhouse to Liverpool.

A question having been raised respecting a supply of pure medicine at the lowest prices for the ensuing year and with the view of adopting the most approved method of advertising for same in time for the yearly Contracts now near at hand it was ordered.

That the Clerk write to the Medical Men of the Union requesting they will be so good as to attend the Board in Saturday next to afford information on the question of tenders for medicine and for each to bring his list of medicines accepted last year.

Tenders from painters were opened and considered and that from William Hunter accepted at 12/- a week - the Board supplying the oil & colours.

A letter was read from Doctor Cartan Oulart stating that the work contracted to be done at the Hospital by Patrick Barry was finished & that the sum agreed for was £40.10.0 but that



He did extra work value for 10/- all of which has been inspected by the Committee who certified that he faithfully performed his Contract and earned the additional ten shillings.

Ordered, That Doctor Cartan be requested to send a Bill of particulars for inspection by the Board.

The Chairman then signed the orders and Cheques after which the Board adjourned.

The Board proceeded with the admission

Mr. Anne Haire appeared before the Board with  
 a male child calling it James Murphy - for admission of the child  
 to the Workhouse stating that she came by the child in the  
 following manner. That she was in bed in her own house  
 on the Drummy road and early in the morning between 4 &  
 5 o'clock on or about the 29<sup>th</sup> January 1863 a rap came to  
 the door and a the person outside asked if Mr. Murphy was  
 within. Mr. Haire answered she was not. She then asked  
 was her sister there & Mr. Haire replied she was. Her  
 brother-in-law John Murphy - got out of bed - lit a candle  
 & opened the door. A woman then entered, respectfully dressed  
 and went to the bedroom of Mr. Haire who had not got up  
 it being then very dark. The woman had a child in her  
 arms and asked Mr. Haire her terms for nursing it for a year,  
 to which she replied she would take £5 - and a £1 - or  
 in hand. The woman then gave her the child and the  
 woman telling her at the same time that the child's name  
 was James Murphy and that she would call to see it in  
 a month. Mr. Haire's sister Ellen Murphy had told her  
 before this occurrence that she was not to give the cradle away  
 as she Ellen was told by Dr. Morrice that a nurse child  
 would come and Mr. Haire supposed that that was the  
 child and therefore took charge of it. Mr. Haire has been in  
 the habit of taking nurse children for payment and thought  
 the woman would come as she promised in a month but  
 she has never made her appearance since, which is a  
 period of 17 months. Mr. Haire is a very poor woman and  
 see no for admission of the child into the Workhouse.



Ellen Murphy sister to Mr. Haie was then called before the Board. She stated she was an assistant Nurse in the Workhouse Infirmary here in the month of January 1863 and that Doctor Nimske whilst she was acting in that capacity had asked her would she take a nurse child. He said that a woman had been speaking to him about a child and he recommended her and that the woman told him the child was 18 months old. The Ellen Murphy then told him that she would take charge of it at £5 a year & a pound gift in hand - that this conversation took place 3 or 4 days before the child was left with her sister. He said sure you could not take it and you here, to which she answered that her sister would take it.

Doctor Nimske being present and hearing the explanation of Mr. Haie & Mr. Murphy stated that a woman called to him and made enquiries where she could have a child nursed. He told her that several persons in town were in the habit of nursing children particularly deserted children and that he knew a woman - a Mr. Murphy who had had several children to nurse and from his knowledge of her was sure it would be taken care of. The woman made enquiries about her and where she lived. He asked him to
