On visiting Mary she wholly denied having ever expressed such a wish and declared her firm determination to die as she had lived a Protestant. She expressed her Resolution to this effect to the Priest in my presence, as I have good reason to believe that Protestant Ministers in general and this girl in particular have been subjected to persecution and annoyance in the Infirmary in order to subvert their faith and especially at their dying hours. I earnestly request the Board of Guardians to order an investigation into the Circumstances of Mary Dale's death.

I desire to draw your attention to the Memo-
randum entered this week upon the P. Chaplain's
visiting Book a copy of which I also enclose
as this is the third occurrence of the kind during the
short period of my residence in Ennis County. I feel
that I cannot with any propriety to the Protestant
Interests of the this Parish pass it over in Silence.

The girl in question Mary Dale otherwise known as the House a Protestant, she had been brought up a Protestant
had professed herself a Protestant and was as far

as I could Judge well instructed in the principles of the Protestant faith. — On Friday last the 17th inst I visited her and read and prayed with her and so far from uttering any expression of discontent or of inclination to abandon the Protestant faith, so she could have appeared more pleased or grateful with a clergyman's visit than she did thanking me for the visit and begging me to come again as soon as I possibly could, on Saturday night the 18th inst a note was received from Mrs Fraser the head Nurse about 11 o'clock requesting the immediate attendance of the Protestant officiating clergyman. The Rev J B Murdoch accordingly visited her and found her too heavy thro weakness and stupor to converse much but still without giving the slightest indication of a desire to change her Religion. On Sunday morning the 19th inst I again visited her at 10 o'clock and finding her asleep as I thought I went about to leave without disturbing her promising to call in the afternoon when Mrs Fraser awoke her saying she enjoyed Mr Murdoch's visit so much the night before that she Mary Dale without the satisfaction of the friend I had been there without speaking to her. I then conversed and prayed with her and nothing seemed further from her thoughts as certainly nothing was further from my mind than the idea of Mary turning R. Catholic. I left her promising to come early on Monday or on that afternoon should she get worse and wished to send for me. At about one o'clock the same day during the Celebration of Divine Service in St Mary's Church a note from Mrs Matton the Matron was handed to me in the reading desk by the Sexton = desiring my immediate attendance as Mary Dale was dying and wished to see the Priest. I left Church at once and proceeding to Mary's bed asked her what made her send for the Priest, in perfect astonishment she utterly denied having ever asked for him or even thought = of him.

97 I then called in the Rev. Mr. W. Walsh R. C. Clergyman who had arrived about 5 minutes after we having been sent for by the Matron and to him Mary made a similar reply that she did not want him - that she was not of his persuasion. At the Matron's request I asked her had any one been tampering with her to induce her to change and she replied they had. that some one had told her if she would only see the Sisters she would die in peace the poor girl was so weak and faint that I did not wish to tire her and as some of her friends had come to her just before my arrival I asked them to remain till my return in the afternoon. She died however about 10 minutes as I am informed after my departure, Such are the simple facts of the case. They need no comment from me. When you remember the helpless condition of a poor dying girl without a single attendant of her own faith to wait beside her I am sure I shall not appeal in vain to you and the Board of Guardians to use such means as may prevent the recurrence of such gross and unchristian cruelty as must have been exercised ^{to induce} (the poor happily in vain) this dying girl to renounce the faith in which she had been brought up and of the truth of which she was as far as we can judge fully persuaded. Sir

I beg to call the attention of the Board of Guardians to Article 34 of Workhouse rules & especially to the words "provided that in any case of sickness affecting the life of an Inmate - the Master of his own discretion or the Matron in the absence of the Master shall permit such Inmate to be visited at once and communicate such request to such Minister accordingly." I have to complain that the above rule has been habitually violated - the last violation occurred on Sunday the 19th June upon that day I received a note from the Matron requiring me to attend an Inmate named Jane Dale who had been a Protestant but who wished to die in the Catholic faith. I went immediately to the Workhouse Infirmary and found the Protestant Minister in religious communication with her - whatever were her previous religious connections - after her interview with the Protestant Minister she did not wish any further

illustration from me - from these facts I hope that the Guardians will see the necessity of at once directing the Master - or in his absence the Matron to attend impartially to the above rule and to send only for the Minister of that persuasion in the faith & hope of which the sick person wishes to die and thus prevent such interference with the wishes of dying inmates as has unhappily taken place in the case to which I have alluded.

H. Chairman. Signed Thomas Walsh C.C.

The Board proceeded with the consideration of claims for relief in the Workhouse and Drury Hospital of the Union - also to cut down relief in certain cases,

Doctor Crawford applied to the Board stating that the Cheque granted to him for Registrars fees £6.16.6 p. 120 was lost - thru the negligence of his servant and requested another Cheque instead,

Ordered. The Clerk to write to the Bank giving particulars of the Cheque and get an undertaking from the Doctor to be accountable to the Board for amount of the Cheque and on this day meet the Board will issue a fresh Cheque,

Agreeably to notice the Chairman read to the Board the Commissioners Letter on the evidence taken at the recent inquiry into the charge made by the Rev. Mr. Hardson as to tampering with the religious belief of the late inmate Mary Dale - also the Evidence itself taken before Captain Hamilton on that occasion; after considerable discussion it was Ordered. That the consideration of the Commissioners Letter dated 13th July Inst. in reference to the evidence taken on the investigation relative to the late Mary Dale and the evidence itself - be postponed to this day week in order to give the Rev. Mr. Hardson an opportunity of explaining or withdrawing

the passage in his report¹¹ by - "As I have good reason to believe that Protestant inmates in general and this girl in particular have been subjected to persecution and annoyance in the Infirmary in order to subvert their faith and especially at their dying hours" also to the passage in the latter part of his letter to the Board, viz "to use such means as may prevent the recurrence of such gross and unchristian cruelty, as must have been exercised to induce (though here happily in vain) this dying girl to renounce the faith in which she had been brought up"

The Question of the Pump required in the House well was then considered and it was resolved to advertise for tenders for an Iron Pump or such other as may be approved and tenders to be considered on this day fortnight,

The Chairman then signed the orders and Cheques after which the Board adjourned,
