The Solicitor appeared before the Board requesting information as to proceedings in cases of putative fathers at the approaching Quarter Sessions.

Ordered, That the Solicitor prepare informations to be sworn on Monday next against Putative Fathers - a list of cases to be supplied to him by the Clerk on this evening - also to take proceedings for recovery of money due for Manpolds which the Clerk

will furnish to him.

For the case of Robert Murray the Solicitor is to confer with the Attorney of the Defendant and do the best he can - thereby preventing further litigation.

A Letter was read from Elizabeth Simwan Menlow - for her sister now in the Workhouse she enclosed provision to pay her fare by rail provided the Board gave her clothing and gave her notice that she might meet her sister on the arrival of the Train.

Ordered, Clothing value £1.0.0. allowed and due notice to be given to Elizabeth Simwan.

Ordered, Leave granted.

The Master Tailor requested leave of absence for a week.

The Committee appointed to examine into the question of retaining or surrendering the farm met and went into the accounts and expenditure for the last 3 years but had not agreed on the question.

Moved by Mr. Dolger and seconded by Mr. Gore

That the Farm be retained and that the Clerk call a meeting of the full Board to decide on the question on this day week which passed.

On examination into the Collectors Accounts it was found that Edward Doyle had made a lodgment yesterday which could not appear on the Minutes as he had not attended for examination of his Books previously nor had he sent the Bank Receipt to the Clerk.

Mr. Burke gave notice that he will on this day fortnight move that the child John Maher admitted this day on Castle Ellis be discharged from that Division and be readmitted on the Union at Large or as the case on Investigation may appear.

The Clerk read the following Minute to the Board.

A Meeting of 3 Guardians Messrs. Hore, Bolger & Tinnelly took place at the Board room on Thursday Evening in consequence of a report made to them by the Medical Officers in charge that the Master was now in a state wholly incapable of continuing in charge of the Workhouse and after conferring for some time came to the conclusion of placing the Porter in charge of the House until next Board day.

They then proceeded to the Master's room accompanied by the Clerk and informed him that they had placed Mr. Doyle the Porter in charge requesting he would deliver the keys to him. She then gave up what keys she had and stated that the Master had the keys of the clothes stores. The Guardians then proceeded to the Master's room and after informing him of the state of things they felt bound to take requested him to give the keys of the clothing stores which he was to do until Mr. Tinnelly would be taken.

They sent for the Agricultural and Schoolmaster and told they would assist Mr. Doyle for a few days by remaining up until a letter from him and

then calling up the Porter and they directed Mr. Doyle not to allow any messenger boys to leave the House whilst in charge but at 10 O'clock A.M. & 4 O'clock P.M. except the postboys from the Clerks Office when necessary and that no spirit of any kind be allowed to pass the Hall for use of any Officer in the Workhouse unless by the Doctors directions.

Ordered, The above proceedings are confirmed by the Board - the Clerks Assistant to give his attendance in aid of the Porter when necessary and that a copy of the above be sent to the Medical Officers in charge and to Mr. Doyle the Porter.

The Guardians further reported that whilst in the Hall that night a messenger boy passed up with a bottle of whiskey to the Infirmary and after questioning him they allowed him to proceed.

Ordered, The Contractor for spontaneous liquors is directed to deliver them on the ground - his ordered by the Board by their water carts.

The report of the Committee appointed to examine into the question of returning or surrendering the Darn was read and it was agreed that the Darn be returned.

Orders for Soda Meal & Flour but being considered too high were not accepted the Master in charge being directed to buy those articles from week to week until further orders.

The Master shoemaker asked for leave of absence for a few days which was granted,

The following letter was read from the Medical Officer — Doctor Kemble dated 1 October 1864.

Sir,
I feel so interested in the Epileptic cases under my care that I beg to direct attention to a few of them. Elizabeth Haurahan who was granted clothing last week with her sister on last Board day being quite recovered was an inmate for 16 years — had attacks every week & often — gradually removed from use of garret wort Beer & is now quite restored to health. William Whittier an inmate for 12 years was a bad case but now so complete is his recovery that he has had no attack for more than 12 months. He is now leaving the House to earn his bread, although an elderly man and hoped the Board will give him clothes as those he had when entering the House have now fallen to pieces. On another occasion he will bring other cases of recovery under the notice of the Board.

He begged to state that he understood from the Doctor that he meant no such thing—see his report to the Board on Saturday last which shows he meant no such thing as the particulars are stated in said report—that he was suffering from nervous excitement with spasms and unable and incapable of performing his duties as present. The words unable to perform my duty at present differ very much from being wholly incapable of continuing in charge of the Workhouse. The Guardians may judge as they think proper.

That he had all the Officers engaged for the last few days collecting the stock of clothing in order to have them ready for coming as soon as the new master is appointed. His ankle is still very weak but notwithstanding he will be able to have the School all arranged by this day week.



We have completed taking the Stock of clothing and implements inside and outside the Workhouse and will bring them to a final close on Monday — it will therefore be necessary to make arrangements as to carrying & expenses for the taking of Stock of the Out Hospitals.

As the shoes are much worn and in want of repair it will therefore be necessary to employ say 2 shoemakers for a short time to repair them — more particularly as the inmates are in want of some. I have made enquiries and find the men employed three years back will come for the same wages namely 7/- per week.

A set of ropes for Laundry spars wanting as the old ones are worn out.

Ordered Car Hire and expenses taking Shells

 upon which the Board ordered a general meeting
 of the Committee to be called to consider the case
 - who came to the conclusion that the charge was
 proved upon which the Board ordered in the
 22nd Inst that the evidence taken be sent in to
 them for consideration and which evidence was this day
 read at the Board and ordered to be placed in
 the Minutes for the opinion of the Commissioners.

Mr. Catherine Perrin stated two of her
 children being sick of Scurvy at her house at
 NTHarry Mr. Dowd came to see them in company
 with Mr. Doyle late assistant nurse in a day
 about the end of September in the forenoon that
 she Mr. Perrin gave a cup of Whiskey to each
 of them and afterwards accompanied them up street
 that when they came as far as the Cellar Mr.
 Dowd asked Mr. Perrin and Mr. Doyle to join and
 take a cup of Spirit each at her expense -
 while there a Policeman named Coady who had
 been a patient in the Hospital pressed Mr. Dowd
 to have a glass of wine or some other liquor -
 she objected but finally took a glass of beer which
 was the only drink she would consent to take
 afterwards Mr. Dowd accompanied Mr. Doyle
 to her home.

Mr. Doyle late assistant nurse corroborated
 the evidence of the last Witness and stated that
 on leaving the Cellar she perceived Mr. Dowd
 affected with liquor and told her to her house

where she remained from about one O'clock till midnight when Mr. Doyle accompanied her to the Hospital.

Mr. Conner wife of John Conner, stated that she had a child in the Hospital in the end of September and she was told that it was not taken proper care of by the Nurse. She went to the Hospital to enquire after the child and when leaving it about midnight met Mr. Dowd and Mr. Doyle going to the Hospital.

Mr. Thompson was also examined but his evidence was irrelevant.

May A. Danell the assistant Nurse stated that Mr. Dowd had sent a Patient whom she named and who had been only four days up to the town for Whiskey and that on the evening when Mr. Dowd came accompanied by Mr. Doyle to the Hospital Mr. Dowd was affected with liquor and also on another occasion when the Doctor enquired for the Nurse at the Hospital she told the Doctor that Mr. Dowd was upstairs not fit to be seen - that she was drunk. The Doctor who was present was asked did he examine whether the assistant Nurse was telling the truth and he said no.

She above was not taken down in writing at the time of examination - it is given from memory now but is substantiated correct.
