I was sorry that I was late for the Committee the clothes coming from Enniscliffy kept me from attending the above. I should be thankful to the gentlemen to have a sworn investigation as to my neglect to the patients or House, but I have made it an Hospital since I came to it, it is not an open house as it was in former times - the gates are locked, I have been as careful for the Board of Guardians since my coming as if it was my own house - they will say (that is parties about this town) that they used to get milk when they wished & could stop in it as long as they pleased, also on my coming I got coals & other things mixed & not in their proper places in the straw house & I know this is doing this long time or more in order to get me out and for other parties to get more, my opinion is there should be no person elected out of N. Barry, there is too many crimes belonging to them and all poor people and since my coming I always done my best for the patients and at as little expense as possible.

Sir

I received your Letter of the 12th Inst. with regard to Maria McDonnell - My Maids acquaint you for information of the Guardians that she was a very good girl for about 6 or 7 months after coming to me but after that she became very lazy and impudent & would do nothing but what she pleased herself nor even that without the other little girl or some other person waiting on her. In fact she became more like the Maids than a Maid in the House. I wanted her when I was busy to come out a day or two to pick Potatoes but she refused to do it. saying she would never work out a day for me or any other person and if we did not like it we might get whom we pleased to do it for her and that she was hired in a place at the Oylegate where she was to get 15/- a quarter and that we might look out for a girl as soon as we pleased. I also had a great fault with her and could not think of keeping her whilst she practiced it. she was in the habit every night of smoking after she went to bed and repeatedly light a Match in the middle of the night whilst in bed in order to smoke. so that my Room was continually in danger of being burned - she has too got a very bad tongue and talks she keeps the house in confusion. Therefore could not think of keeping her any longer. My Opinion is that when leaving the Workhouse she had no intention of stopping out for any time but came out for the purpose of getting clothes as she was often heard to say she would spend her Christmas in the House.
