When we take into account the many duties which keep her occupied from early morning until late at night - it is marvellous what progress she has already made and I am satisfied that at the expiration of two months her proficiency will be such as to satisfy the Board concerning her entire fitness for the situation.

I wrote several lines for her yesterday which she read with ease and she wrote her name and several words in a way that would reflect credit upon persons possessing much greater advantages. But in order to remove all just ground for complaint I would respectfully suggest to the Board the propriety of giving Mrs. Kenny during these two months the assistance of a young woman named Jane Donohoe an inmate of the House for the last seventeen years -

of a spotless character and who can write well,

Of course you will agree with me that we ought to go all reasonable lengths to retain a good and faithful servant, and as it is unnecessary to speak of Mr. Kenny's character, which is unexceptionable, I will merely say that I almost despair of ever seeing her place filled by anyone in whom the self poor will repose such confidence, and who will discharge her duty with greater fidelity.
