Ordinary Proceedings

The Board proceeded with the consideration of applications for relief in the Workhouse and Poor Hospitals of the Union - also to outdoor relief in certain cases,

On Consideration of the case of Joseph Murphy and family living in the street of the Harb - a note was read from Mr P Walsh - of Carrigem stating that Murphys wife and children were now all sick except the infant and that they were now in a very destitute state,

The Temporary Relieving Officer then informed the Board that as directed on last Board day he had visited that family and seeing that the Husband was confined to bed and the family destitute gave provisional relief until today,

Ordered, The Relieving Officer to give 5/- relief for one week and request the Medical Officer who has been for some time attending the family to send a Certificate to the Board stating whether the Husband can or cannot be safely removed to the Workhouse,

The following letter was read from Mr Hall Dore
WTFBony decr 19th 1865.
My Dear Lord

I write to you as Chairman of the Board of Guardians and beg to request that you will lay before that body - the following statement,

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon as follows (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year)

I think that it would be to the benefit of all parties if the litigation which is still pending between my father and the Board of Guardians could be brought to a termination by some equitable compromise. I am most anxious that we should forego further legal proceedings - not indeed because I fear an unfavourable verdict for I am disposed to judge from the opinion of an eminent Lawyer who has lately been consulted that the contrary would be the result - but because a matter like the present when pushed to an issue gives rise whichever way the verdict may go to an amount of scandal and ill Blood which had better be avoided.

I therefore offer to the Guardians a compromise the essence of which is that both sides should give way a little, so that a settlement may be effected.

I propose that the Board should take a Lease for ever of the Poor Hospital at WTBony at a nominal rent, such Lease to continue in force so long as the Poor Hospital may be used for charitable purposes - that each party should pay their own expenses and if there be a sum due which would be chargeable to the unoccupied side - that they should each pay half of it.

The favour of an early decision would oblige me as should my offer be refused I should like to have as much time as possible to make preparations for the Assizes but I hope that the Guardians will see the propriety of meeting me half way in putting a stop to so undesirable a Dispute by accepting what I consider but think very fair and reasonable offer.

Ordered, The Board agree to the above proposal provided the woman and child are kept out of the Workhouse - otherwise the decree for £7.0.0 to stand good against Henry Mowles, in our Solicitors hands.


