 I now take the liberty of informing the Board
 that since I have only received orders for 130 Rugs,
 half the quantity of Linsey Wooley - no order for
 Blankets. Consequently I have on my hands
 - 200 yards Linsey Wooley, 70 Rugs and
 50 pair of Blankets. In filling up my tender
 I stated I was willing to deliver my quantity
 meaning as you can easily understand my quantity
 over the quantity specified, as a proof of this
 altho only 100 yards of twilled Calico was specified
 I received an order for 300 yards and supplied it notwith-
 standing that when I received the order this had advanced
 in value fully 20 per cent and that this understanding
 was mutual is clear from the fact that another Contractor
 filled up his tender for the exact quantity of each article
 specified and his tender was filled up without any
 objection on your part in accordance with his tender
 - thereby binding the Board to take the quantity specified
 of each - under those circumstances I have every
 confidence - that the Board will not place me
 in a worse position than if I had bound them as
