The following letter was read from Dr. Crawford, Embsworth 19 Sept 1866
My Lord & Gentlemen

On every occasion that Cholera has visited this country, The Town of Embsworth has suffered very considerably from it, and now that it is no longer our Doctor as at present in both Arundel and Worthing, I consider it my duty to urge upon you to adopt such precautionary measures as I consider are best calculated to prevent an outbreak of the disease, and if we should be so very unfortunate as to be visited by it to be in such a position as to meet with promptness every emergency with an immediate remedy. I would propose that

[This to be entered on the occasion of every appointment of a new Committee, after the Annual Election of Guardians, and on the occasion of any election to fill any vacancies in a Dispensary Committee.

The Board elected the following Ratepayers to be Members of the Committee of Management of the following Dispensary Districts, respectively:—the Clerk to make a Return accordingly to the Poor Law Commissioners, and to issue the prescribed Notification to the Members elected, and to the Medical Officers of the respective Dispensary Districts, in pursuance of Articles 1, 2, and 3, of the General Regulations for Dispensary Districts.—The Clerk was also directed to supply Check Books of Medical Relief Tickets, (Forms E 1 and E 2,) in pursuance of Article 27 of the Dispensary Regulations, to the new Members of the Committees; namely:—

all sanitary arrangements and operations should be prosecuted with the greatest energy and that the Dispensary Medical Officers of the Town should be appointed ^{Dispensary District, Mr.} Chief ^{of} Inspectors each to have the supervision of his Medical District.

That in order to meet promptly every case of sudden illness in the Town, The Embsworth Dispensary should be open daily and that public notice of this be posted up in order to insure immediate attendance for medical advice.

That in as much as the Astro Hospital is the best suited building for a Cholera Hospital (in case such be required), having on the spot a supply of all medicines that might be required and a full working staff of Nurses &c it should be used for that purpose. That a proper covered Conveyance for the removal of the sick be always at the spot, ready for immediate

We, Order dated ^(state subject.) That a Porter or Messenger who would be willing to attend at the removal of the sick be engaged and ready to attend whom wanted.
