My Lord & Gentlemen
On every occasion that Cholera has visited this Country, the Town of Emiscorthy has suffered very considerably from it and now that it is so near our doors as at present in both Dublin and Wexford, I consider it my duty to urge upon you to adopt such precautionary measures as I consider are best calculated to prevent an outbreak of the disease, and if we should be so very unfortunate as to be visited by it to be in such a position as to meet with promptness every emergency with an immediate remedy. I would propose that

The Board elected the following Ratepayers to be Members of the Committee of Management of the following Dispensary Districts, respectively:—the Clerk to make a Return accordingly to the Poor Law Commissioners, and to issue the prescribed Notification to the Members elected, and to the Medical Officers of the respective Dispensary Districts, in pursuance of Articles 1, 2, and 3, of the General Regulations for Dispensary Districts—The Clerk was also directed to supply Check Books of Medical Relief Tickets, (Forms E 1 and E 2,) in pursuance of Article 27 of the Dispensary Regulations, to the new Members of the Committees; namely:—

The guardians further beg to inform the Commissioners that a large population in the suburbs of the Town is not within the boundary of the Dispensary District, Mr. of the Town Commissioners and that if they had not taken immediate steps for the thorough cleaning and removal of Nuisances, Cholera would in all human probability have visited the town which would have entailed incalculably greater expense as may be instance in the neighbouring towns of Wexford & Arklow.
