The Out-door Relief Register was produced, examined, and authenticated from No. 9699 to No. 9709 inclusive, by the Signature of the Chairman, and Counter-signature of the Clerk.

The Clerk's Report on the execution of Orders previously made by the Board was read to the following effect:—

That he had issued Notices respecting the Nursing of some Orphan Children to be taken into Consideration this day, that the Master informs him that one of them is since dead and another dying.

Ordered, That the Master having been asked how many Orphan Children in the House requiring to be sent out to Nurse — and stating there was but one at present — the Board postponed sending out the Child — at same time that very great care must be taken of that Child and the Master to report again.

and having appeared was married. On this
day fortnight his wife appeared for him and
stated that her Husband was in bed at
home and dangerously ill. The Relieving
Officer visited him by Order of the Board
and found him at his usual work stripping
Osses to make baskets and offered him
a ticket of admission to the Workhouse
which he would not accept - that it was
out door relief he wanted - but on the
Second day after he did come into the
Workhouse.

The Medical Officer
informed the Board that he called in
to see Murphy the day after his wife made the
application having had some suspicion as to the
truth of his dangerous illness and found he was not

dearly however he might want Infirmary relief
he left directions with his wife and he came into
the Workhouse the following day when readmitted
him to Hospital where he remained under
treatment.

He would have discharged
him soon to the Infirmary Ward but that the
Board seemed to take such interest in the
case from the report entered on a visitors
ticket issued to Murphy. Subsequently
Murphy informed the Board he would
leave the Workhouse on Sunday next & go to
his work.
