I am glad to report the Convalescence of Anne Nellis who was so dangerously attacked with Cholera. Her case was a most aggravated one nor can I account for the cause of her illness. She took no food that ought to have disagreed with her but she had slight diarrhoea for two or three days.

It was not a case of Asiatic Cholera tho the symptoms were as severe as any fatal case during the last Epidemic. She was in a state of Collapse for two days.
