His disease was Bronchitis and Spasm of the lungs from which exertion he then got worse — throwing up Blood — and of course he gave a certificate that he could not be removed — not wishing to have a Coroner's Inquest if he died on the road. He had seen Wallace more than once expecting the next day to hear of his death and for the last ten days the poor man by my orders struggled out of bed to creep in to the open air with the help of his stick.

The Board having called on the Medical Officer of the W. House to give an explanation in writing — the following statement was read.

I hereby certify that I examined Pat^l Wallace of Killan Division on the 17th May last and did not consider him a case for Infirmary relief. He was labouring under Chronic Bronchitis.
