"That they carefully investigated the several matters embodied in the same resolution and are of opinion that 2 Horses would be more than sufficient for all the work of the Institution and strongly recommend the Poney and Grange to be at once sold and thereby saving to the ratepayers a yearly sum of at least £40-

The tillage of the Farm does not exceed 18 Irish acres and we consider the Steward being a good Ploughman should be able for all that work - as from enquiry & personal observation the help obtained from the paupers - male & female is sufficient for a much larger Farm. We are glad to be able to state that the Corn crops look well, & that but we consider that the manner in which the Mangold ground is prepared and the Meadow laid down is far from being creditable to those who had the management of same. By carrying out the above suggestions a saving of about £66 a year will accrue to the ratepayers,
