Very respectfully I have under my care as Dispensary Patients persons who require Hospital Surgical treatment and operations and who wish to be treated by me. I have no Hospital or place where I can place them for that purpose which is a cause of regret to such persons being deprived of the services of the person by whom they wish to be treated and of the advice they have most confidence in.

There is a small Ward in the Deane Hospital in close connexion with the Dispensary which would hold two beds and which is not required for other purposes.
