In moving the above Resolution Mr. D. Lynn spoke as follows,

Mr. Chairman

It is with mournful feelings that I announce the melancholy tidings that the oldest member of this Board has ceased to exist on earth, there's a vacant seat at the Board today and the Public thereby have sustained an irreparable loss. The amiable John that filled that seat has disappeared for ever. The voice so often heard at this Board advocating the rights of the poor and the oppressed is now mute and silent.

John Bulger has passed away and we shall know him no more, but altho he has passed away yet the recollections of his usefulness at this Board will long survive him.

We shall often miss his wise counsel - we shall often miss his ample store of knowledge the result of long experience which was always at the service of this Board when difficult questions arose for discussion. The Poor have lost a warm hearted friend and a sincere Benefactor. Through life he was their friend and in his death bed he did not forget them.

The Ratepayers have lost a stern and an inflexible upholder of their rights and interest. Every one must admit that he was an honest, upright and just man, remarkable for many good qualities but particularly for the tenacity of his friendships and his sterling integrity. Some time since he appeared at this Board for the last time. No friend or acquaintance of his then anticipated that his useful career would have terminated so soon but even then - the Angel of death

was on his track — the allotted term of his pilgrimage on earth had expired and the inexorable decree was issued calling him from amongst us at the patriarchal age of 72 years. He is gone to a brighter and a better world to obtain the reward justly due him for a long life chiefly dedicated to the service of suffering humanity. Every Guardian here must travel the same road. Every Guardian here must pay the debt which he has now discharged — The steady March of time will bring to every man of us our time.

What Guardian here would not feel gratified should he happen to be a member of this Board, when he receives the final summons would he not say feel gratified in anticipating that a similar tribute of respect would be paid to his memory by the surviving members of this Board — then let us resolve to adjourn as a token of our respect — as a testimony of our love for the venerated Father of this Board who has gone to his eternal rest,
