I consider it my duty as a member of the Committee of Management of the Enniscorthy Dispensary to direct the attention of the Guardians to the quantity of Medicines brought before the Committee for their Order on the 3rd April last by the Deputy Secretary Mr. P. M. Cooke which Committee will be duly considered according to article 22 - page 15. of the general rules and Regulations for the Government of Dispensary Districts - In that supply there are many articles not in the Catalogue which should be just sanctioned by you on the application of the Medical Officers agreeably to the same rules and regulations at page 94. Moreover that this supply of Medicine was not duly ordered by the Committee of Management as is also directed at page 11 - article 15, section 5, of the same rules and regulations - these irregularities I consider ought to be investigated on oath in order to allay any impression that might exist of the undue ordering of unusually large quantities of medicine or medical appliances in the Enniscorthy Union.

On my last visit to the Union I remarked upon the irregularities which prevailed in regard to the mode of procuring and accounting for supplies used in the Dever Hospital in connexion with the Workhouse and I made at the same time some suggestions with a view to their correction.

The Observations made by me were read at the meeting of the Guardians on the 8th December last and an Order was made at the same time directing that the suggestions which I submitted should be carried into effect as soon as may be - that Order was communicated to me and I very naturally expected

to find some improvement on my next visit but I regret to have to state that with the single exception that supplies are ordered by the guardians instead of the Medical Officer and are entered on the Provision receipt and consumption account kept by the Master the system which was in existence in December last still continues to prevail.

There is still a separate Receipting, a separate Provision Check account and it still continues to be impossible to apply any sufficient check to the consumption of food and stimulants in the Dever Hospital.

The account of the food used in the Hospital is computed by the Hospital Porter. The Diet ordered for the patients are entered in a form of Book not authorized by the Poor Law Commissioners and wholly unsuited to the purpose for which it is intended - the same Book purports to show the Wine and Whiskey ordered daily but the Porter who kept the account cannot himself at the present time tell whether the figures entered represent the one liquor or the other - there is no authority whatever for the issues of the meat Tea & Sugar consumed in the Hospital nor is there any for the milk issued in the form of an extra. The Check applied by the Master to the account kept by the Porter is inadequate ~~and is not a check at all~~ in fact as a record of the issues the account is imperfect and unsatisfactory and it is wholly impossible to apply any check to it at the present time.

I stated on a former occasion that all articles issued in the form of extras should be ordered by the Medical Officer in his own

Handwriting as required by article 18 of the Commissioners Regulations and I added that I would require such authority to be produced to me in future in such authority has been produced to me for the half year ended the 23rd March last.

I made several suggestions at the last Audit intended to diminish labour and facilitate check but they have not been carried into effect and I will again state them briefly for the consideration of the guardians.

1. I would suggest that the Poor Hospital should be treated as a Ward of the Workhouse and that the issues of food should be regulated and accounted for in the same way as the issues of food to the Infirmary.

2. That the useless and imperfect forms of Books in use should be done away with and the following Books kept viz. "a Record of sickness and Mortality" and a "Weekly Medical Return" in the forms prescribed by the Commissioners and copies of which are I believe in the Hospital.

3. That all variations from the authorized Dietary and all extras prescribed should be ordered and authorized by the Medical Officer in his own handwriting as required by the Regulations.

4. That the Account of food and stimulants consumed in the Hospital should be kept in the

A Letter was lately written to the Board of Guardians and has since appeared in one of the local papers by Dr. Kouske, in which he complains both of the Medical Officers of the Emmesthy Dispensary and of your Committee.

We now feel it our duty to give an explanation of the charges brought against us by the doctor - He states that the Order which was passed at the meeting of the 3rd of April for medicines was unusually large, that a large number of the medicines in it were not in the

The Board elected the following Ratepayers to be Members of the Committees of Management of the following Dispensary Districts, respectively:- the Clerk to make a Return accordingly to the Poor Law Commissioners, and to issue the prescribed Notification to the Members elected, and to the Medical Officers of the respective Dispensary Districts, in pursuance of Articles 1, 2, and 3, of the General Regulations for Dispensary Districts. We have to say in reply that the Order for medicines is unusually small, and that an exception - for medicines on last year is less than the preceding one by £20-0-0 and that we have always as far as we could studied as much economy as was consistent with the requirements of the sick poor under our charge.

The Medicines which were ordered by us not in the Commissioners list were but few in number and amounted only to a few shillings. They were procured for special Patients requiring them and only in very small quantities. They will no doubt appear on the next revised list of the Commissioners. They were ordered at the time as being more suited to the requirements of the sick than in need of them than the old preparation of the same Medicines in the list - and

We have the satisfaction of assuring the Committee that no extra price has been charged for them by the Contractor as was the custom with former Contractors on such Occasions.
