Mr Robinson further states that the Fever Hospital at Oulart was very clean but the front wall appears to be in a dangerous state and to be inclining outwards and he suggests that two strong iron bars should be put thro' the Building to bind the front and back walls together with as little delay as possible and the Commissioners request the immediate attention of the Guardian to Mr Robinson's suggestion
