Bryan who has given notice on this day fortnight that he would on this day bring under the consideration of the Board the question of the principle or principles upon which the Governors of the Wexford Lunatic Asylum are nominated sent a telegram from Dublin stating that he regrets being unable to attend the Workhouse this day —

The following report was read from Mr Percival Atkin Honorary Secretary to the N.T. Barry Fever Hospital Committee

Agreeably to request of the Board of Guardians I have entered into a Contract with a man named James Curran for sinking a Pump in the Fever Hospital grounds. The work was commenced four days since I am in hopes that an ample supply of water will be found at a moderate depth. Curran is to be paid at the rate of 4/6^d for each foot in depth he is to wall the sides and remove the stuff raised out of the sinking and leave it ready for setting down the Pump. One third of the price is to be retained till October to test the supply of water.
