Medical Officers Report

I have had a most difficult case of Midwifery and to call on the assistance of Doctor Goodisson who was in ~~an~~ immediate attendance with me.

I consider it my duty to report on the different articles supplied by Contractors which came into my use and under my inspection in the Infirmary during the last year. The Milk except at the 1st testing which the Master can explain has been pure and free from any adulteration. It shows by the Test tubes an average of about 8 percent of cream. The specific gravity is from 33 to 34 percent at a temperature of 60. I test it every day. The Whiskey supplied is not giving satisfaction and in only 4 or 5 instances has it been supplied at Contract strength. It had often to be returned and Whiskey the same strength sent. The Master will be able to explain. The Wines were middling only the Port which had to be returned once. It was accounted for by recent bottling. The Brandy was very inferior and weak, only 17 percent under proof. The Contractor for Meat had to be frequently re-examined and the Meat returned. The parts usually supplied are the inferior pieces of good Meat such as the bloody part about the neck and breast. Altho Colman's

The Reports of the Master and other officers were read, and Orders made thereon, as follows:—

Best Mustard was contracted for only in one instance and upon great exertion on part of the Master was the genuine quality supplied. Colman's British Corn flour was also advertised for and accepted but in no instance has a Packet been supplied. May I call particular attention to the Mustard as being very serious — the application of bad Mustard may endanger loss of life and be useless in cases of emergency. I would nearly say the same of the corn flour as Colman's preparation is most nutritious both to young and delicate persons in need of its use. The other Supplies I have no necessity to notice unless brought under my special observation.
