The Board have also to observe that the estimate has been carefully prepared with regard to past expenditure and the existing liabilities and credits and no exception can be taken to it in these respects while as a further ground for not departing from the estimated rates the Board desire to point out that the average weekly cost of maintenance per head which at this time last year was 2¹/₂ is now increased to 3¹/₂ per head and the expenditure of the Union will be increased accordingly.
