### Medical Officers Report.

On Friday last Mr. Kennedy sent me the Copy of a Resolution of the Board requesting me to "test and report on the milk of the Contractors."

I beg to state that I have very carefully read over the rules laid down for the guidance of Workhouse Medical Officers, I find that I have no authority whatever to examine or report on the milk or any other supply of Contractors — on the contrary it is quite evident that to do so would be to assume part of the duties and responsibility of the Master.

Under the heading "Masters duties No 22 states that he is to receive all provisions and other articles purchased or procured for the use of the Workhouse and before placing them in the store to weigh the same and examine and compare them with the bills of parcels or invoices severally relating thereto and having proved the accuracy of such bills or invoices to authenticate the same with his signature and submit them to the Board of Guardians at their next ordinary meeting.

From this it is quite clear that no article of food becomes the property of the House, and consequently does not form part of the diet of the inmates till the Master has admitted it to the store.

But it is as the diet of the House that No 5 of Medical Officers duties — obliges me to test the milk and this I am most willing to do,

The Reports of the Master and others Officers were read, and Orders made thereon, as follows:—

I must therefore respectfully decline "examining and reporting on the milk of the Contractors" unless the Local Government Board decides the responsibility of an ~~inferior~~ inferior officer may be divided with one who is in the House but for a short time each day and never when the milk arrives.

I may add that the master is supplied with a lactometer, that its application is extremely simple and that when I examine the milk placed on the breakfast table it is the surest place to see that the inmates get it of a proper quality.

Order. The Board request that the Medical Officer will assist the master in testing the milk when required.
