In consequence of Mr. G Brown refusing to supply Bread as agreed upon by the Board on Thursday last, The clerk to advertise again for Tenders to supply best white Bread to the Workhouse and Enniscorthy Fever Hospital for the following three or six months as the Guardians may determine, Tenders to be considered on this day fortnight and that the Master supply the House and Fever Hospital during the interim at the old Contract price.

- 1st. What Guardian proposed that Tenders be issued for repairing the old grave yard wall at Templeshannon.
- 2nd. Was there a special Board Convened according to the usual practice to sanction what has been decided by the Local Government Board to be an illegal expenditure.

3rd. What special reasons existed for making an exception in favor of the Enniscorthy Free Yard and learning that twenty others ~~were~~ within the Union in a most shameful state of delapidation

4th Did the Board appoint any Committee to examine and inspect the work done by the Contractor, state the names of the Guardians that constituted that Committee also produce their report.
