" At a meeting of the Dispensary Medical Officers of the Union of Ennisceorthy held on the 21st October Inst. It was resolved to direct the attention of the Board of Guardians to the following facts connected with the question of remuneration under the Public Health Act.

The appointment of Dispensary Medical Officers as Sanitary Officials was totally unsought by them and is in their opinion calculated to prove injurious to their interests as it must bring them into antagonism with the Inhabitants of their Districts and thus reduce materially their private practice.

To compensate for the loss so resulting as well as to remunerate them for the increased amount of work which will be thrown upon them in carrying out their duties under the Act, the Board of Guardians the sum of £40 only a reasonable addition to their salaries.

In the particular instance of this Union the Maximum of one fourth of the salary at present given — recommended by the L. J. Board would be manifestly inadequate while the salaries in every Union in Leinster are at least £100 a year and in many cases £120 a year. — the Guardians grant only £90. Hence if the suggestions of the Medical Officers be adopted — the total annual sum granted say £130 will not be in excess of what the other Unions are authorized to pay. The Board of Guardians are requested to remember.

The following Letters on Matters arising under the Medical Charities' Act or the Nuisances Removal and Diseases Prevention Acts, from the Local Government Board for Ireland and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively to the following effect, or orders were made on them respectively, as follows:

Read Letter from P. Murphy, S.S.O. dated 26 Nov 1874 stating that

He visited the village of Orlegate in the Capacity of Sub-Sanitary Officer. He found nuisances in the village and will without delay send his report to the Sanitary Officer of the District.

Letters read from the Local Government Board dated 25 November 74 No 25,098. Stating that they have had before them a scale of additional salaries proposed by the Board of Guardians for the Sanitary Officers under the Public Health Act, and with regard to this subject they call the attention of the Guardians to their Circular letter of the 8th Ultimo, and request that the Guardians will be good enough to further consider the subject of additional salaries to be fixed for the officers appointed for the purpose of making them more in accordance with the scale recommended in the above Circular.

The Local Government Board also states that the amount of additional salary proposed for Mr. Patrick Murphy exceeds one fourth of his present salary as Relieving and Sanitary Officer and they request that the Guardians will reconsider the subject with a view of fixing at not more than one fourth.

The following letter was read,
Enniscorthy November 25th 1874.
Gentlemen,

In reading the proceedings of the Board of Guardians of Enniscorthy Union as reported in the "Herald" of the 24th Instant. I perceive that Mr. Flynn when speaking to a resolution arising out of a notice of motion relative to the reduction of my salary as Sub-Sanitary Officer made the following statement, which in justice to myself I beg leave to contradict and take this opportunity by bringing the matter under the notice of the Board of Guardians to do so. Mr. Flynn stated as follows. "for it is well known to many members of this Board that Patrick Murphy succeeded his father some years ago as Street Inspector under the Town Commissioners at a salary of £15 a year. Subsequently an Act of Parliament conferred Sanitary powers on the Town Commissioners then they advanced Patrick Murphy's salary £5 a year for the additional duties which the Act imposed on him" This statement is entirely incorrect and devoid of foundation. I succeeded my father as Inspector of Nuisance not as Street Inspector at a salary of £20-16-0 a year and not £15 and from the time I succeeded my father up to the time the Sanitary powers were transferred from the Town Commissioners to the Board of Guardians about a month since, there were no new Sanitary powers invested in the Town Commissioners nor did that body ever increase my salary. When the Sanitary Powers were transferred from the Town Commissioners to the Board of Guardians the situation of Inspector of Nuisance was then abolished as the Commissioners Certificate read at the Guardians meeting already proves. I was then appointed by them as Street Inspector which position I now hold. I annex at foot a statement signed by Thomas Wilkinson Esq. Town Clerk proving what

What I have now stated to be correct regarding my first appointment under the Town Commissioners, Mr. Flynn also very fully described the extent of District which another Sub-Sanitary Officer had to travel over and the arduous duties he would have to perform but he did not so fully describe my District although he proposed a resolution to reduce my salary, I will now for the information of the Board of Guardians explain the extent and conditions of my district thereby shewing the amount of duty I will have to perform under the Public Health Act, My District meets the Wexford Union at the For and joins the New Ross Union at the termination of the Townland of Rathturin 3 miles beyond Clonroche and the Carlow Union at Mount Leinster. This District ~~comprises~~ including a large stretch of country also includes seven villages, namely, Clonroche, Kellam, Kiltaly, Cain, Bree, Redgate and Oylegate, also the town of Enniscorthy the extent & population being one of the largest in any rural Sanitary District in Ireland containing 17 lodging houses and 11 slaughter houses to be inspected and reported on with all other premises, The salary first fixed by the Guardians was £25 a year or about 1/5 per day for my district which I have endeavoured to describe, Mr. Flynn moved to have the £25 reduced to £10 a year or about 6 1/2 pence per day and Mr. Byrne now intends to move that the salary for me under the Public Health Act be fixed at £15 a year or about £10 a day, I have in the foregoing explained what I consider called for in connection with the subject, I now respectfully ask the Guardians to read and judge for themselves and in conclusion I must add I would not trouble the Board with this letter had Mr. Flynn been correct when he undertook to explain to the Guardians the conditions of my late employment
