The Report of the Visiting Committee was read, and orders were made thereon, as follows:—

### Medical Officers Report.

A number of Cases of Erysipelas having occurred in the Hospital within the last week. He considers that they should be entirely separated from the other Patients and would propose that the detached Wards be opened one for the Male and the other for the female side as both are equally afflicted.

It would be also advisable that one ward on each side of the House be closed for a week or ten days and thoroughly disinfected - another two could then be closed and so on till all are disinfected. To effect this it would be necessary to send some of the patients who are best able to their respective 'Infirm Wards' a more generous diet there, would then be required.

Some cases of Paralysis on the Male side of the House who require assistance at night as well as in the day cannot be properly taken care of by the Nurses, He believes that there ought to be an active man for the purpose, the old men at the disposal of the Master are wholly unfit for the duty.

~~The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and orders made thereon, as follows:—~~

With regard to your minutes respecting the amount of stimulants used in the Hospital, He considers that the lives of the Patients would be endangered by diminishing the small quantity ordered to each.

He would respectfully suggest that any guardians who think stimulants are ordered unnecessarily, would meet him at any of the daily visits and he would feel assured that they would recommend him to increase the allowance to many of the Poor Creatures.

It is a notable fact that when those poor old people leave the Infirmary, apparently in good health they are often not a week in the Infirm Ward, deprived of their little allowance till they have to be taken back often in a dying state.
