Ordinary Proceedings.

The Board then proceeded to the Consideration of applications for relief in the Workhouse and Fever Hospitals of the Union, also for Outdoor relief which they granted in Certain Cases.

The following explanations were read from the Schoolmaster and Schoolmistress in reference to the irregularities in the Schools. Reported by the Master on last Board day.

Schoolmaster's Explanation.

The Master having on last Board day made a Complaint in respect to the School Children.

About a Month ago the ~~Master~~ Called a Messenger boy from the yard. The gate was locked and the boy went over the Wall, I was on the land at the time and could not of course prevent the irregularity, this is the only Case I can recollect and I believe the only Case that occurred for a long time.

I am always present with the Children in the Dining Hall during meals to keep proper order and I have always endeavoured in the School and in the House during the absence of the Master and on all other occasions to preserve and promote order, discipline and morality.

Schoolmistress's Explanation.

With reference to the Master's report of the 10th Instant, I admit that the infant boys and girls (20 in number) occasionally prattle, laugh, and cry at the time of meals and during school hours. My indefatigable efforts to quiet them have not been always successful, I wish they were for their innocent noises very often disturb my own peace and the studies of the elder girls.

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year.)

He has also reported that the children "cross the wall" I beg to state I never saw a child climbing over it, I would not allow them to endanger their lives, I have indeed often seen them at the Wall endeavouring to catch the birds and bees that light on the ~~the~~ shrubs growing against it. They are also fond of pulling off the little red berries that appear on the shrubs sometimes, as the Master disapproves of their doing these things, I have forbidden them and have evinced my displeasure and directed them to keep in the centre of the playground. I never violate article 48 & 49 of the Workhouse Rules, but prefer in lieu gentleness combined with firmness.

Calling the attention of the Guardians to the provisions of the 4th Section of the Sewage Utilization Act 1865 and the 46th Section of the Public Health Act 1848 and the 7th Section of the Public Health Act 1874 and stating that it is now the duty of the Board of Guardians acting as the Sewer Authority, to have the Public Sewers vested in them properly cleared, cleansed and emptied.

Ordered. The Guardians will attend to the matter and S. Officer Mr. Murphy employ a person for the purpose. The following letter was read

Permit me to call your attention to the great want there is felt in Clonroche by the Inhabitants owing to the want of water it has to be carried a considerable distance altho there stands in the village a pump with I believe a good supply of excellent water in the well, but the Pump has been out of order for some years I believe it could be repaired at a moderate cost, I would also ask your immediate attention to a large open Sewer that runs through the village by Mr. Robinson's lawn. It seems to be the receptacle for all the filth of the village and I have no hesitation in saying that if warm weather sets in I fear owing to its present state we shall have much sickness prevailing. The village altogether requires much sanitary looking after.

The following reports were read from the Sanitary Officer Doctor Furlong.

In reference to a Slaughter House in New street Erniskerry belonging to James Cullen, recommending that the Slaughter House be closed,

Ordered. That the Executive Sanitary Officer prepare a notice to be served on Mr. Cullen calling on him to abate the nuisance by discontinuing to use his present premises in proximity to the street, as a slaughter House, giving him Three days to comply with the notice.

Another report in reference to the Slaughter House of Mr. George Keely. He stated that he considered the place unsuited to the purpose as at the time of the slaughtering it must be a nuisance to the neighbours and prejudicial to their health. He recommended that the Slaughter house be closed.

Ordered. That notice be served on Mr. Keely calling on them to abate the nuisance by discontinuing the use of the present premises in proximity to the street as a Slaughter House, giving them Three days to comply with the notice, and that the Sanitary Officer see that the notices are complied with.

Another report in reference to the Pump on ~~By~~ Market Hill which is in a very bad condition being open at several points, a portion of the Contents flowing out in the street and creating a nuisance injurious to health. He recommended it to be at once put into working order and properly closed in. Ordered. That notice be served on the road Contractor to carry into effect the recommendation of the Sanitary Officer to be done within one week our Executive Sanitary Officer to prepare said notices, To be served at once.

Another report in reference to pools existing at the rear of the upper range in Fagan's lane, which are not only calculated to be very injurious to the health of the neighbourhood, but overflow in wet weather and run through some of the Houses. He recommends that they be at once filled up and a proper sewer constructed to carry off the surface water.

Another report in reference to some cesspools of stagnant water in the village of Redgate that he visited and found the cause of Complaint to exist, in fact all the pools in front or beside the Houses contain animal and vegetable matter in a state of decomposition highly prejudicial to the health of the neighbours and recommended the receptacles to be filled up or else that proper sewers be constructed.

Ordered. That notice be served on the owners of the premises to carry into effect the recommendation of the Sanitary Officer within one week, such notices to be prepared by the Executive Officer.

Another report from same in reference to cesspools in the village of Redgate which he on his visit found to contain matter in a state of decomposition highly injurious to health and recommended that the sewer leading therefrom to be put in proper ~~repair~~ order, which it now appears to be completely closed up.

Ordered. That notices be prepared and served on the owners of the premises to carry into effect the recommendation of the Sanitary Officer within one week.

The Sanitary Officer of Newtownham Dispensary District reported that the well known as the Peaching House well is unfit for drinking purposes and dangerous to health. It is exposed to receive dirt and nuisance of all kinds and the place about it is in a very dirty state. He recommended it to be entirely closed up and a pump or fountain be erected in the Market Square adjoining, the Town being in great need of a supply of pure water.
