 then in a dying state and died on the morning of the 5th
 February at 10 o'clock A.M.

It is very difficult to get on with the ^{Farm} work owing to the Horses being engaged from the plough so often. Particularly at this season of the year. — from the 15th December 1875 to the 1st March 1876 there were 52 journeys performed by them some of them from the most distant parts of the Union. Newtownbarny, Blackwater Killeghney &c. from the 1st of March to this date there were 22 journeys performed, added to 52 makes 74 journeys out of 87 working days. He knows it cannot be avoided, the above statement is merely to show that the man and horse are more than $\frac{2}{3}$ of their time employed this way and that some of the journeys are short yet the delay of engaging the plough, stopping at the patient's residence and in the delivery the day is spent. The Horse is also employed every morning drawing out the waggons, so it is impossible to get in the crops in proper time unless some other means be adopted, Besides Crossploughing, Harrowing and grubbing there are 150 Bbls of lime to be Carted out — requesting the guardians to give the matter due consideration and when the Horses here have to perform these journeys to hire other horses to sow the crops.
