"I regret to state that the Turnip crop is a failure though they got up well & were looking healthy, but are now all gone.

The Mangel crop is a partial failure, I was in hopes they might all come up if rain had come.

I think there is a sufficient stock to transplant if the weather answered, but owing to the scorching sun, the harsh winds & night frosts without any moisture, not even a dew - I fear there is no use in attempting to transplant, or to sow the turnip land again, unless the weather changes, nor is there any use in sowing cabbage plants, for the young plants are dying in the seed bed for want of sap, though I had them watered.

I completed the Hay Rick on yesterday.

The Hay in graveyard requires to be cut.

Stimulants used in Infirmary, it appear-

Stimulants, during week previous to Mr O'Brien  
visit was \$6. 15. 1 of which \$4. 4. 9 was the cost  
of Wine, Whiskey & Brandy - The attention of  
the Go<sup>m</sup> is called to this subject.

With regard to the dietary of healthy  
inmates of W. H. Mr O'Brien calls attention to  
the fact, that 1. 2. 3 classes receive only 2  
meals a day, their dinner hour being  
2 o'clock P.M. & breakfast at 8 o'clock the  
following morning - Mr O'Brien is of opinion that  
the quantity of food allowed is sufficient, but he  
recommends that it should be so distributed in



it, as to provide for a 3<sup>rd</sup> meal, as is the practice in most Unions, & the d<sup>g</sup> Brequests that the G.O.<sup>m</sup> will take M<sup>r</sup>. House Buildings are reported in a good state of repair, but, M<sup>r</sup>. O'B recommends that the W. House should be painted internally & the d<sup>g</sup> Bencloses a specification of the work upon which a contract can be made by the Guardians - Ordered: To be considered this day week.

She instructed this child as a Catholic & lived & died one herself. She has been for some time before her death, a servant at Clare's & the boy remained there for a short time after her death.

Aidan Murphy, the father, then took him away, Clare up to that time, making no claim to him and giving no opposition to his removal,

I fancy therefore the J<sup>d</sup> have no intention of allowing this Catholic child to be proselytized by Clare - To give the boy up to his father, Aidan Murphy, who to devote him to destruction
