The Board must be well aware that the majority of those in the Medical and Surgical Wards are hard-working industrious people who have come in not through any poverty but to come under treatment for injury or disease



In my opinion it is a great hardship and an injustice to treat them so unfeelingly, for I well know that they scorn the very name of "Pauper."

As a matter of fact the dread of classifying themselves with the inmates of the Workhouse proper is a potent cause of preventing many from availing themselves of the advantage of Hospital treatment.

I would suggest that the Grand Jury would request the Boards of Guardians to appoint the Workhouse Masters or other Workhouse Officer to be Inspectors under the Sale of Food & Drugs Act of 1875 for which purpose such persons should first be appointed Sanitary Sub Officers. The Guardians of Rathdrum Union recently appointed their Workhouse Master a Sanitary Sub Officer and at his Suit a Contractor who supplied adulterated milk to the Workhouse was fined last month by the Magistrates sitting at Petty Sessions.

It is only when persons are fined for breaches of the Sale of Food Act - at the prosecution of an Inspector - that the fines are payable into the local Treasury. If the Guardians of a Union prosecuted a person for supplying them with an adulterated article any fine that might be imposed would be paid into the Imperial Treasury.
