

Medical Officers Report

The Local Government Board has directed that I as Medical Officer of the Union Hospital should be called upon to report as to the quality of the stimulants at present supplied for the patients.

May I now request that the Guardians will in common justice to me point out to the Local Government Board the report of the special Committee appointed by you to enquire into the use and quality of the stimulants used in the Hospital. This Committee held its investigation in the Clerk's office on the 26th day of last April and to them I stated my opinion that New Whiskey was quite unfit for a medical stimulant. My statement was embodied in the report of the Committee which was subsequently read before a full meeting of the Guardians and was also published in the local papers. In the face of this opinion of your medical officer a tender marked New Whiskey is accepted by the Board not many days after. I now feel that I have fully performed my duty in directing the quality of stimulant required. And my advice being totally disregarded it would be manifestly unfair to hold me in any way further responsible. It also appears to me very unfair to ask me to analyse or report on any goods contracted for considerably above their market value.

I must again respectfully decline the responsibility of seeing that the Contractors of supplies to the workhouse fulfil their obligations.
