TO THE BOARD OF GUARDIANS
OF ENNISCORTHY UNION.

MY LORD AND GENTLEMEN—

Twelve months having now elapsed since you did me the honor to elect me as your Clerk, you will not, I am sure, be displeased, if I respectfully ask you to reconsider the amount of salary then fixed.

You will remember that the reduction from £130, *p* annum, (the amount which the late Clerk received,) to £80, was adopted as a *temporary* measure, and it was distinctly stated so at the time, in the Resolution of the Board. I feel confident that a consideration of the duties attached to the office will convince you that the larger sum was by no means an extravagant or undeserved payment.

Permit me to give you a few items of those duties as specimens:—Take for instance, the Relieving Officers Books. There are, on the average, 350 cases (not persons) weekly—making a total of 18,200 yearly, every one of which is examined *weekly*, by me, in *detail*, both as to amount of outlay and extent of order, thereby obviating any debits of illegal expenditure either to Guardians or Relieving Officers by the Auditor.

Then again, the Rate Collectors books contain an aggregate of 8,600 entries, every one of which is examined and checked by me *three* times, before lodgement is made, entailing the consideration of 25,000 separate and distinct items.

These also involve the copying yearly from the Valuation Books of the 8,600 entries, and the calculation and affixing of the Rates imposed on each holding, a most troublesome, laborious and exacting labour, for which assistance has to be procured and paid for by me, for a long period of the year during the preparation of the books. This alone makes a large reduction from the salary of £80.

Clerk's Salary

I mention these instances merely as examples, and enormous as they are, they are by no means the most exacting parts of a Clerk's duties. A glance at an Abstract will give you some idea, and a very inadequate one, of what is involved, Half-yearly, by the calculations which Electoral Division Accounts entail. These could not be tabulated or expressed in any statement like this. They are almost incalculable.

I would ask you to take into consideration the large extent and valuation of this important Union, (£110,414), with Receipts and Disbursements to the extent of nearly £8,000 annually, with its 32 Electoral Divisions, its six Dispensary Districts, its three Fever Hospitals, three Relieving Officers, and seven Rate Collectors.

Add to these, the almost endless accounts connected with the *internal* business of the Workhouse itself, requiring constant supervision—the Medical Officer's and Master's Books of which there are more than a dozen, the Contractors' Bills, for which in one year 767 cheques, making 3,068 entries, were issued, and over 700 payments in Petty Cash made—the never ceasing "Returns" to be sent to the Local Government Board, exclusive of the Weekly Minutes, which alone represent two days' work each week, and the tremendous correspondence involved on all sides, and you will, I have no doubt, come to the conclusion that you ought, as an act of fair play and justice to one willing to serve you faithfully, honorably, and to the best of his ability, revert to the original payment connected with the Office, especially as it can be done at the trifling charge of *one-ninth* of a Penny in the Pound on the Valuation of the Union.

The Sanitary Condition of this District

is wretched, and the number of cases of disease arising from bad sanitary arrangements (e.g. Typhoid Fever) unusually large. The small death-rate for the quarter ending June 30th was due to the Equable temperature of the three preceding months. The dung-heaps and cess-pools along the road-sides and in many places where I was called to treat cases of disease, were most detrimental to Public Health and teeming with disease germs. The owners being law-abiding were good enough to have them removed on my first remonstrance and did not wait to have their cases reported.

Now the houses of small farmers & cottiers away in the fields and on the mountain side must be in a still worse condition, and as I am unceasingly employed otherwise owing to the indiscriminate distribution of red tickets, (I attended Sunday morning on a red ticket the wife of a farmer who rents over fifty acres of land) I find no time to hunt up those outlying places. Even were spare time on my hands it would necessitate the keeping of an additional horse to visit all those places, and my miserable salary is quite inadequate to that.

I would suggest that the Sanitary Sub-officer come around once a fortnight and make his report so that I might be enabled to proceed directly to the house, complained of.
