Gentlemen,—The following is a statement of the facts of the case to which Mr. Denis Lawler's letter of Thursday last refers:—

On Sunday evening, the 9th of this month, a ticket, signed by Mr. Lawler, was presented to me to attend the son of a man named Devereux who, although holding only 4 or 5 acres of land, is generally believed to be in comfortable circumstances, and to have some spare money. I learned at the time, that two messengers were sent—one to the town to see if a ticket could be got, and another with a fee, in case of failure to get the ticket. The ability to pay being thus proved, I remonstrated against their trying for a ticket, but as it was got I attended on it within two hours. After the attendance, Devereux, knowing that I was aware of his having sent the money, paid me a nominal fee.

On Monday I went to Mr. Lawler, who after hearing the circumstances, at once withdrew the ticket. On that evening I had a message from the patient, who appeared to be going on favourably under the treatment adopted, and renewed his medicine. On Tuesday morning, Devereux came to me, saying that his son had got worse during the night. From what he mentioned, I believed that an operation might be required, and as the necessary appliances and assistance were not at hand here, I urged him to lose no time in sending him to the Infirmary in Enniscorthy. I also gave him a note for the Master, asking him to admit the case, and to send for Dr. Furlong without delay. Late in the afternoon, when I thought the man had long since arrived at the Infirmary, I got a telegram informing me that Dr. Drapes, who was of course paid for his attendance, would be with me at 7 o'clock to see the case. We visited, and did the best we could for the patient, but without succeeding in our endeavours as he died the following night.

From the statement of the facts it will be evident to the Board that there is no foundation for the assertion that the ticket was refused. It was protested against but acted on, and the attendance was continued after its withdrawal, though I take it for granted that the Issuer would not withdraw the ticket on my representation, if he did not think himself warranted in doing so. In conclusion, I beg leave to say that I think I would not be doing my duty, as an Officer of the Board, if I allowed, what appeared to me to be an imposition on a public charity, to pass without taking some measures to prevent it. To have the ticket cancelled a month afterwards would be of very little use for this purpose, and I adopted the only means which appeared likely to effect it—acquainted the issuer of the ticket with my reasons for thinking the person not entitled to Medical Relief at the expense of the Union, and it was then for him to withdraw the ticket or not as he thought fit.




