Sir, - The Local Government Board for Ireland have had before
them the Scale of Dietary recommended for the infirm class of in-
mates in the Enniscorthy Workhouse, by the Medical Officer in
his report, a copy of which was forwarded with the Guardians
minutes of the 4th instant, and I am to state that the present
scale of dietary in use requires revision, but this should be done
after a careful examination of the details by a committee of the
Guardians and the Medical Officer. It would also be desirable to
distribute the food allowed that all classes should receive a
light evening meal, and it would be well to discontinue the use of
strabout and sour milk in the case of the infirm classes. It is not
usual, however, to supply butter or eggs in workhouses, as pro-
posed by the Medical Officer's books, and the Guardians, before
framing and submitting for sanction a new scale of dietary, would
do well to make themselves acquainted with those in use in the
neighbouring Unions.

Enniscomthy Dec^r 13th 1877

Gentlemen,

I beg to inform your Board that on the 12th Inst. I inspected the villages of Bree and Galbally in the capacity of San. Sub Officer. On inspecting the premises of Mr. Richard Aspel ^{Galbally} I found causes of complaint to exist. Consisting of a piggery in a very filthy state without any means of drainage and a large cesspool filled with stagnant matter which caused a most offensive smell. I also visited the Constabulary Barracks and premises at Galbally and found the sanitary condition of same to be most imperfect there is an open drain from the Barrack yard through which I saw very offensive matter flowing into the premises of Mr. Aspel above alluded to. I also found a piggery without the slightest means of drainage. I immediately after inspection handed the usual reports to Dr. Stack the sanitary officer who was present during my inspection. and he is to make reports to your Board today. As regards the village of Bree I found its sanitary condition satisfactory the pump recently erected by the Board of Guardians is in perfect working order. and affording a plentiful supply of water to the villagers.


